



"Coincidences" multiply when we pray


hope you all have had a relaxing summer and, wherever you have been, that you have travelled well. In May I had the pleasure of attending the European Leaders' Forum in Poland. Six Irish Presbyterian ministers enjoyed each other's company as well as the Bible studies and seminars attended by about 800 people altogether.

On the morning of our departure, we complained about having to leave our hotel so early. It was going to mean hanging around Krakow Airport for several hours. I was sitting at the front of the bus beside my dear friend Daniel Kane and, as always, the conversation was easy. As I placed my passport, IPad and travel documents in the pouch in front of me, it was as if I heard an inner voice saying to me: "Don't do that! You'll forget them."

Arriving at our destination, I rescued my suitcase and was standing at the terminal entrance as the bus pulled out. Suddenly the life drained from me: "My passport"! Immediately I gave chase, even though there was very little likelihood of being able to catch an accelerating bus. My hope was that it would stop at the exit barrier, giving me at least an outside chance of catching up. However, it got worse when one of my colleagues shouted after me that I was heading in the wrong direction and apparently I completed a pirouette with Basil Fawlty style elegance and panache. To no avail!

My friends gathered around me in the foyer and began to pray in good Presbyterian style: "Lord, we know You are sovereign, but you are also the God of Providence. We need You to intervene now". Desperately I wanted to embrace their faith-filled prayers, but my mind was already racing ahead to what I would do next.

I spoke to the girl at the



Information Desk and visited the Easyjet kiosk. Somebody bought me a latte to calm my nerves. Another phoned the hotel, which phoned the bus company and it in turn contacted the driver. Nothing was found! We sent through a second message to give the precise location of the missing items – directly behind the driver's seat and not in the overhead racks.

Amazingly, my possessions were found and the bus company laid on a taxi which rushed to the airport. The night before I had toyed with the idea of buying a book, but for once in my life resisted temptation and held on to my remaining 25 euros. I was told that the taxi driver would be standing at the information desk at 12.10pm, holding the course logo. And the fare? Sure enough, it was 25 euros, although I would have gladly given so much more. As I subsequently realised, I would have had to travel to

Warsaw, then buy an emergency passport, book a premium flight and perhaps accommodation as well.

A moment of profound thanksgiving! As we arrived at Belfast International, I joked with my friends that my salvation had been in doubt, but they got me through to the other side: "Yes, McMullen, even though your heels were singed on the way!" was the reply.

Meantime, back in Krakow after the morning's drama, the six of us joked over coffee about possible sermon illustrations! In a nutshell, for me it's amazing how "coincidences" multiply when we pray and the wonderful fellowship we receive from our Christian friends. And now that my travels are over for a while and my passport safely stored away, it's time again for me personally —and I hope for all of us - to be excited together as a community of Christian faith and expectancy here in West —standing

together, being there for each other, expectant and full of hope, seeing those prayers being answered as God ushers in the full dimensions of His Kingdom life.

Now I know it doesn't always work out as it did for me that morning and it's all the more important that we are there for each other through the lows as well as the highs of life, but for me these had been moments of incredible faith and prayer. And there again, if we had been allocated the later shuttle bus and arrived later that morning, then I would have missed my flight!

The Apostle Paul wrote these words for us as we journey through life: "For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels

nor demons, neither the present nor the future, not any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord."

equipping disciples to make disciples

he award-winning Freedom in Christ Discipleship Course is a proven and effective way for churches to help Christians become fruitful disciples. It involves 13 sessions and a ministry component called the Steps to Freedom in Christ. There is normally an Away Day around week 9 or 10 of the course. This course has been used by around 300,000 people in the UK

Why does this course work?

Far too few Christians reach their potential. Some simply drop out. Why? Usually because they don't have a real understanding of their new identity in Christ.

Traditional discipleship teaching can sound like this to them: "do this every day", "don't do that any more", "successful Christians behave like this". So they end up simply acting like Christians. Some manage to do and say the right things but don't necessarily live fruitful lives. Others constantly require help with the same issues and some just drift away.

The Freedom in Christ approach first helps people grasp all that

happened the moment they became Christians: who we are in Christ; the truth of God's unconditional love; why there is no condemnation; why we don't have to languish in cycles of sin, negative thinking and hopelessness.

Good teaching on its own however is not enough. Although the key to freedom is knowing the truth (John 8:32), simply **telling** people the truth doesn't mean that they really **know** it. This course also has a kind and gentle ministry process to help people repent of past sin and resist the devil. For many this "clearing out of rubbish" is the key to the teaching falling into place.

There are 4 parts to the course:

Part A—Key truths:

Jesus said that we will know the truth and the truth will set us free! In the first three sessions we will look at some of the key truths we need to know about what it means to be a Christian.

Part B—The World, The Flesh and The Devil:

Every day we struggle against three things that conspire to push us away from truth. Understanding how the world, the flesh and the devil's work will enable us to renew our minds and stand firm.

Part C—Breaking The Hold Of The Past:

God does not change our past but by His grace He enables us to walk free of it. In this section we look at how we can take hold of what Christ has done for us in order to do just that.

Part D—Growing As Disciples:

Having taken hold of our freedom in Christ, we now need to concentrate on growing to maturity. In this section we will learn how to stand firm, how to relate to other people and how to stay on the path of becoming more like Jesus.

We will be running a Freedom in Christ course here in West throughout the autumn on Thursday evenings, beginning 21st September in the Conference Room. Please register your interest to attend by signing up at the main office noticeboard or by contacting the Church Office by telephone or email.




united appeal FOR mission



THROUGH THE EYES OF A CHILD


The official Press Release by United Christian Broadcasters following Elliot Gray's trip to Tanzania


ust before Easter, 11 year old Elliot Gray from West Church travelled with his dad Dave to Tanzania with the child sponsorship charity, Compassion, to make a promotional video. A major part of this film was recording, meeting and befriending 13 year old Anold from Olkollili near Mount Kilimanjaro.



When Elliot met 13 year old Anold in April, it was an unlikely friendship; the boys live 7580 km apart in different families, neighbourhoods, races and cultures.

Anold lives in a remote hillside village of around 3,000 residents. The houses in Anold's neighbourhood are mostly made from earth and clay while the roofs are made from grass or tin. Anold's own house has no electricity supply but some of





the surrounding houses do. The local customs in Anold's village make early child marriage a particular risk for girls whilst boys often work as animal herders. 85% of the adults in Anold's area are unemployed but when they do work, they often work as farmers, herders or plantation workers. The average

income for adults in his neighbourhood is £9.00 per week.

Elliot is going into Year 8 at Sullivan Upper School, Holywood. He loves reading, Tara his dog, Mario Kart, chilling with his mates and music—he sings his way through life! He plays rugby for CIYMS minis and was recently at a Mini Rugby



tournament at Butlin's Minehead, hosted by Leicester Tigers. He collects fossils and preserves insects and has a reconstructed Lego version of Middle Earth in his bedroom. He loves being part of JClub in West and coming to church with his mum and dad and younger sister Amelie.

Elliot describes, "Before I met Anold, I felt both excited and a bit nervous. Once I had spent a bit of time with him I really liked him—he was a lot like me and we got on well together, he spoke English very well and we chatted a lot. We loved playing rugby together."

During the trip Elliot was shown around Anold's school, classroom, library, Compassion project and home. Elliot describes, "Anold lived on a farm and most of the buildings were made out of mud and wooden walls, although his dad is building a new house out of blocks, bit by bit as they have enough money. They had wallpaper made from newspaper. The family has two pigs, a cow, a chicken and 3 goats. Anold gave me a lesson and I loved milking the nanny goat! They don't have a lot of stuff in their house like us but have everything they need."

"At school, all the kids sat in rows and they didn't have many books. The teacher asked them questions and wrote with chalk on a blackboard. There was no interactive whiteboard or computers and very few books or posters. There were a few good roads but most of them were made of mud. People bought their food from sellers who set up stalls of fruit and vegetables beside the roads and a lot of ladies carried food like big banana bunches on their heads. They loved the rain, it was so important for them to grow the food they needed."

Anold is connected to a sponsor through Compassion, a child development charity which seeks to

empower children living in poverty through the support of local churches. Compassion has more than 60 years experience working with some of the world's poorest children. At present more than 1.5 million children attend Compassion's church-based projects in 26 of the world's poorest countries.

Dave reflects, "We visited two projects while we were in Tanzania. The contrast between a community that had partnered with Compassion for the past seven years and the other that was just at the beginning of that journey was stark. I loved the flourishing of Anold's young life and the life of his whole community because of Compassion's investment."

We have as a family, sponsored Barack (age 7) from Arusha, through Compassion UK for 6 months.

"I think that visiting Barack and witnessing the transformation in the lives of all the children we met will shape Elliot's understanding and connectedness to people who struggle with poverty, but more importantly remind him that it is possible to make a significant difference in their lives by partnering practically through sponsorship. Our family, in a real way, has adopted this little Tanzanian family and is richer because of it."

Elliot recalls, "The thing I learnt most from this trip is that the world doesn't revolve around me. I appreciate more what I do have. I can see how I can help kids who don't have as much as me and I will try to do this through all my life."

It is being used to encourage people to sponsor children at a new project, 250 kids here are waiting for families or individuals to partner with them and invest in them and their families, helping them to grow and flourish, demonstrating practical love in Jesus' name.

(Ephesians 1:17-21)



Samuel Prayer Hub

'Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening' (1 Samuel 3:10)

In the Samuel Prayer Hub we, like Samuel, seek to hear what God has on His heart, and how He leads us to pray.

We begin seeking God's face through worshipping and resting in His presence as the Spirit leads,



being completely focussed on Jesus, and blessing Him for all He has done and is doing. We simply enjoy the presence of God and enter into the deep place with Him where we enjoy Him, and Him alone. There is no human agenda other than this, as we are, quite simply, offering ourselves to Him. Experiencing the love of God changes us and takes us into a place where we see things from God's perspective and where our prayers seem to flow effortlessly from Him. He has a redemptive plan for every person, town and city, land and nation and gently coaches us into partnering with Him in bringing it about.

We capture the heartbeat of heaven, praying in response from our hearts, and sharing the joy and freedom such prophetic intercession brings.

'My house will be called a house of prayer for all nations' (Mark 11:17) were words God spoke of West some fifteen years ago. Was God speaking of a time when many, many would gather together specifically to meet with God in prayer and intercession in the building called West, that is His house of prayer?

We can confidently declare these words from Mark's gospel as the promise of God for West. Let us all do so!

God encourages us to pray strate-gically and who better can give us the necessary strategies than God, Himself. He speaks prophetically to us and we respond in intercession, declaring the truth of what He has said. His strategies are not mere human strategies! Read about the battle 'won' by Gideon (Judges 6, 7) or the one 'fought' at Jericho (Joshua 6). Think about Hezekiah's plan when threatened by Sennacherib (2 Kings 18,19) and how God defeated the enemy.

God gives us prayer strategies and we look to Him for focus and understanding as to how to pray with results. Then we can be sure the birthing will come because we are praying from a place of victory in Christ.

After exhorting the church to stand firm, taking up the armour of God, Paul writes (Eph 6:18), 'And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's

people."

Samuel Prayer Hubs meet on the first Wednesday of the month from 12.30—1.30 pm, beginning October, and on the third Monday of the month from 7.30—9.00 pm.

The Samuel Prayer Hubs focus on prayer that is prophetic intercession. There are other different prayer meetings throughout the week that have a different, and equally important, focus. Please do pray and think about where you 'fit' and feel comfortable in prayer and come along to any of the prayer meetings listed, or speak to Catherine Bell or Heather Thompson if you would like to develop a prayer group with a different approach / emphasis.

What is crucial is that we all pray!






INTO THE WEST— MY JOURNEY

s a child growing up in the rural South Down town of Rathfriland, my highlight of the year was when my family made the long distance trip (seemed long as a 5 year old) to Bangor to visit my Aunt Anna and Uncle Jim Noble who, in those days lived in Wandsworth and latterly just a few doors down from West on the Crawfordsburn Road. West was one of the landmarks that always indicated that indeed we were nearly there!! I always looked at the building as being strange and couldn't imagine it being a church.....they didn't look like that in Rathfriland. I smile every time I walk through the door and still have no idea how God managed to get me here.....but then God can do anything with anyone at anytime!

Fast forward 40 odd years and here I am, a member of West Church. I will spare you all the details other than to say that I was the typical Presbyterian. Brought up in a Christian family, went (made) to go to church every Sunday, Sunday School, Bible class etc. Married at 22 divorced by 30 and numerous broken relationships.....I was the black sheep of the family. God had other plans, I just didn't know it yet. I met a girl from Newtownards at a horse event in Galway and there started my journey to the Ards' Peninsula. Again this relationship didn't work out but, during this time, God gave me the amazing privilege of becoming the earthly dad to two beautiful girls, Anya now 11 and Rhiana aged 9. At this point I was living in Ballygalget (close to Portaferry) and, with the encouragement of an ex work colleague, began to attend church in Greyabbey. I must admit that it was daunting going through those doors after not having been to church for years.



One Sunday Paul Orr was speaking and his message was based on Luke 19. At that moment I realised that I was just like Zacchaeus (minus the wealth) and I NEEDED to see Jesus. Home I went, got down on my knees, and asked Jesus into my life. Thank you Lord!

After this, I became more involved in the life of Trinity, attended the Christian Endeavour course and latterly became a leader with that particular ministry, BUT, there was still something missing!

As part of the outreach in Greyabbey, it was decided that we would run a Cafe Church for a few weeks. On Sunday the 10th of April 2016, along with other Trinity members, we came to visit Cafe Church in West. Here's where God's plan started to unfold! A guy called Gavin was interviewed that day on the work of a group called Safezone. I had been having a niggle for a while about helping others. So on that morning God very clearly used Gavin Fry to speak to me.

Before I left the building, I had given Gavin my number and, for the next few days, thought nope, if he rings I will make some sort of excuse that I can't make it to Bangor. Saturday the 16th of April and still no news from Gavin Safezone and I was off the hook....phew! And then it came, a text to say that I was on the rota. What excuse can I make?

That night I was going to Trinity to a concert by the Salvation Army band and guess what the message throughout the night was? *Serving on The Front Line.*' God speaks in wonderful ways, we just have to be prepared to listen. I had been engaged to a girl who I had met in Trinity but sadly that relationship too had fallen through...my Saturday nights were free. Again God at work!!


So, on the 16th of April I made the journey from Donaghadee to Bangor not having the slightest idea what I was in for. On my first night on the streets I was partnered with this big bloke called Johnny Mawhinney. I could hide behind him were my first

From night one I knew that Safezone was where God wanted me to be. God had used ALL of these things in my life to equip me to help others. So all the mistakes that I had made in my life were not mistakes but lessons...again Thank You Lord. At this stage I was finding it difficult to go to Trinity because of that broken relationship and my dearest friend Nicola asked me would I take her to church sometime. Nicola and I have worked together for 20 years and she still frightens me when she rings to see why a customer hasn't paid their account!! I prayed and asked God where was the best place to take her. Cafe Church kept coming to mind. So from Christmas, Nicola and I started to come to West on a regular basis. I also started coming to the evening service, an experience which I thoroughly enjoy and get so much out of.

Moving church is one of those things you don't do as a


UCB PRAYERLINE

t the 10.00 am service on Sunday 4 June, Rev Charles McMullen acknowledged the two David Bail(I) ies in our congregation. Pictured right with Charles are (I-r) Mr David Baillie, who was one of the first group of elders to be ordained on Sunday 19 March, 1967, and Rev David Bailie, our much loved Minister Emeritus, who served in West from the establishment of its cause in 1961 until his retirement in 1998. Mr David Baillie remains a much loved and deeply respected member of Kirk Session, who still attends meetings and makes valuable contributions. Charles expressed his appreciation from the pulpit of David's wise and gentle leadership, his wisdom, thoughtfulness, kindness and encouragement.

Rev. David Bailie records these reflections in the history of the congregation, "West Church Journey": "The service, in which our first elders were ordained and installed, emphasised for us all that we have done something highly significant in creating a Kirk Session for our congregation...Our new Kirk Session held its first meeting on Tuesday 21 March (1967). Perhaps its most important decision was to meet regularly for Bible study and prayer. The Kirk Session will be studying the Acts of the Apostles, surely an appropriate book, for here we have an account



of the very first days, months and years of the Christian church. Do not expect a whole spate of duties and guidelines from your new Kirk

Session. Its members feel keenly that if they are to be a blessing to the congregation then, like the first followers of Christ, it is necessary first of all 'to wait' and 'to pray' rather than to rush out at once and attempt to do this, that and the other thing! As a Kirk Session we feel very much that we ourselves need the Pentecostal power of God. And we invite the whole congregation to join in praying that we may both want and receive a vital new experience of the Holy Spirit Himself."

The others ordained to our first Kirk Session also included Harold Barkley, George Frame, Norman Gardiner, William McMordie, Thomas Patterson, Cecil Scott, Robert Shanes, John Sloan and Harry Wakelin (all pictured left).

DON'T FORGET, BUT LEARN FROM THE PAST



erner Oder was the guest speaker at the January 2017 Shoah Memorial service at Bangor West Presbyterian Church. Born in Austria, Werner is the pastor of a Christian fellowship near Bournemouth. His father was a high ranking SS officer responsible for the brutal deaths of many Jews. Werner tells of those tortured, early years of his life in his book 'Battling Nazi Demons'.

On the Sunday he shared different aspects of his powerful testimony at the three services. With his background as the son of a terrorist, he shared on playing the hand life has dealt us. We do this by remembering that God, for each of us, has written our story from the beginning to the end. Werner suggested that 'history' should perhaps be spelt differently --- His Story --- in order to reflect this. Who better than Werner with his background to help us work through the commandment to 'honour your father and mother'?

A visit to the S.U. at Bangor Grammar School at lunchtime on the Monday was attended by over 30 of the students. Werner told them the story of Irena Sendler who managed to smuggle out and save 2500 kids/infants from the Warsaw Ghetto. Having told the students about the Irena Sendler project, 'Life in a Jar' that some students in Kansas embarked upon, he urged his attentive listeners to take on a project of their own.

Different people will have taken away with them different aspects of the weekend but for many the best wine was saved to the Monday night, when Werner was the guest speaker at the annual Shoah Memorial Service. Special guests from the Belfast Jewish community attended and several office bearers from the local branch of the Council of Christians and Jews (CCJ). We welcomed as co-Presidents of CCJ Bishop Noel Treanor, the Bishop of Down and Connor, and the Very Rev. Ken



Newell, a former Presbyterian Moderator, with his wife Val. Also present from CCJ was Rev. Ivan McElhinney, a former president of the Methodist Church in Ireland, with his wife, Phyllis.

We welcomed back the Rabbi of the Belfast Synagogue and Patron of CCJ, Rabbi David Singer, who was our guest speaker last year. We were delighted and privileged

to welcome Shoshana Appleton, co-Chair of CCJ and her husband Ronnie Appleton QC, vice-president of CCJ and a past president of Northern Ireland's Jewish community. Also present were Michael Black, chairman of the Belfast Jewish Community, his wife Margaret and Gerald Steinberg, President of NIFI (Northern Ireland Friends of Israel) accompanied by his wife Maris. We invited our Jewish friends (Haverim) on to the platform where they received a standing ovation from a smiling congregation of around 300 people.

The praise, ably and sensitively led by Andy Heron and David Spencer, included a hymn to the tune of Hatikvah (The Hope), the Israeli National anthem. Some verses from Isaiah 40, the passage that begins with 'Comfort ye, comfort ye My people ..' were read in English by Bishop Noel Treanor and then in Hebrew by Rabbi David Singer.

Following this we had tributes to two Shoah survivors. The tribute to Helen Lewis was read by Barbara McMullen and the tribute to Inge Radford was read by Rev. Charles McMullen. Helen Lewis had been Barbara's drama tutor while she was training to be a teacher and Inge had



met Charles at the Holocaust Memorial Day event in Bangor two years ago. We were delighted to have with us Inge's daughter, Dr. Katy Radford MBE, who penned both tributes. Inge died in March 2016. She was the last survivor of the Shoah in Northern Ireland.


Two of the young people from West, Michael and Heidi, led us in prayer and it was great to have them with us. It is so important that we "encourage young people not to forget but to learn from the tragedies of the past without traumatising them by it".

Werner Oder then explained why the Shoah was important to him and why it should be important to us. It was a challenging message delivered with clarity. So many nuggets in his message for folk to take away with them, it is difficult to summarise and still do justice to all that he said, but here is one such nugget that he

told us about. In April 2010 there was a volcanic eruption in Iceland and the resultant ash clouds disrupted travel in Europe for 6 million airline passengers as flights were cancelled. It was prophetic for God was saying in this 'Act of God' that He had not forgotten the 6 million of His people who were burnt to ash in the Shoah. You can understand why Werner's

talk has been described as 'a revelation' and why people who were there have described the service as 'memorable' and 'powerful'.

The Aaronic blessing, said in English and then repeated by Werner in Hebrew, brought a night and a weekend that will long be remembered in West to a conclusion, but not to a close. The retiring offering will fund visits to Shoah survivors by a fellowship in the Galilee which



the Bangor West *Prayer for Israel* group partners with. The offering, with other gifts, is in excess of £1000.

Using the initials BMW (Werner has two motorbikes, one of which is a BMW) we can sum it up by saying:

A Blessed weekend
A Memorable Shoah service
A Worthy cause

OUR JOURNEY TO LIFE IN ABUNDANCE!

n his early years, Ken was very involved in 1st Presbyterian Church in Saintfield. However, after joining the Army Cadets and moving to Belfast, his circle of friends inside and outside school began to have a negative influence on him and he moved away from church based life.

Sandra was brought up within the Church of Ireland denomination, believed in God and was very involved in many aspects of her Parish Church in Belfast. She had no personal relationship with Jesus at that stage but then something happened that turned Sandra away completely from Church life!


Her father whom she adored and who was her best friend died very suddenly at the age of 56. Sadly, her older brother Raymond also died suddenly a few years later at the age of 27! It's not possible to express the anger that Sandra felt at such sorrow descending upon her family. Her deep sense of loss and watching her mother coping emotionally and financially as a single parent caused her to ask:

How could a loving God do such 'a thing?"

When we married (a long time ago!) we moved to Newtownards where God was "side-lined" as we worked and just got on with life.

We were very happy when our lovely daughter Alison was born but again sadness entered our lives when the Doctor told us that she might not live! Alison was taken to the Ulster hospital shortly after being born and although eventually discharged, we were unsure for almost a year whether she would be brain damaged or not.

After much soul searching and only for social reasons, we decided to have Alison baptised in Regent Street Presbyterian Church. We both felt guilty at doing this because we were responding positively to questions about a faith we didn't have! When our much-loved son Peter was born two years after Alison,



Peter was baptised in the same church but for the same reasons and with the same sense of guilt!

We started attending church for Alison and Peter and as the years passed we became more involved in Church activities. We could only be described at that time as being good living, religious people! Sandra was still very anti-Christian and argued continually with her Christian friends about this so called loving God!

Who in their right mind could believe in an invisible God who had changed their lives?!!

In September 1985, Ken's father died very suddenly from cancer and the sort of questions Sandra had been asking for years began to take on a new significance for Ken.

Sandra eventually attended a 'Life in the Spirit" seminar led by Rev David Bailie. His very wise teaching on the Holy Spirit, the amazing things that happened and ultimately the power of the Holy Spirit so changed Sandra that she committed her life to Jesus in December 1987 Our lives have never been the same since!

The change in Sandra was so

obvious that Ken wanted what she had found and in January 1988 he ioined the next "Life in the Spirit" seminar in West Church. He too experienced the power of God at work and committed his life to God in May 1988. Alison and Peter both committed their lives to God a short while later!We remained as members in our Newtownards church but continued to attend services and various faith building groups in West. However, after much prayer and very wise advice from Charles, we finally joined West in 2015! We are now members of a loving and supportive House Group, Ken is on the Peru Board and Alison and Peter are members of the Church Choir.

Our Christian journey also reaches across the border where we are members of the very small congregation of Arvagh Parish Church, Co Cavan. Sandra's ancestors have been associated with this church since the late 1800s!

We praise and thank God for all his abundant blessings since we came to faith but it has not been without trials or tribulations! Ken had a serious heart attack at 49 years of age! He was carried through that situation by sustained powerful

prayer from West and elsewhere and experienced the healing power of God. The verses in *Isaiah 40 v 28-31* are a constant reminder of God's promise from that time.

Do you not know? Have you not heard?

The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth? He will not grow tired or weary, and his understanding no one can fathom.

He gives strength to the weary and increases the power of the weak. Even youths grow tired and weary, and young men stumble and fall; but those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength.

They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint.

Isaiah 40: 28-31 (NIV)

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The various difficulties that we have experienced are common to many people but God continually uses those experiences so that we can help others in similar circumstances. Importantly, now that we have committed our lives to Jesus, we bring all of our difficulties to him in prayer. The beautiful hymn "What a friend we have in Jesus" says it all!

We have also experienced times in our lives when people have hurt us and we have sometimes struggled to forgive them as God forgave us. The words of C.S. Lewis are appropriate: To be a Christian means to forgive the inexcusable because God has forgiven the inexcusable in you"

Since coming to faith, we have seen the power of prayer touch many lives. Our lives have been transformed through the power of God's Holy Spirit. God has often spoken powerfully to us with amazing, timely and relevant words from the Bible.

And I tell you, Ask, and it will be given to you: Seek and you will find: Knock and the door will be opened to you."

If you then, though you are evil, know how to give good things to your children, how

much more will your Father in Heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask Him" Luke 11 v 9 and 11

Our prayer is that through these verses God will speak powerfully to you too




WEST **ALPHA** Autumn '17

MAY GOD BE PRASIED

ord Beverbrook always annoved the editor of Britain's best selling newspaper 'The Daily Express' in the 1920's. He owned the paper and would phone the editor around 9.00 pm and tell him "Hold production, put this story on the front page". One evening the night caretaker answered the newspaper phone. 'I want the Editor now' came the voice. 'No, I won't bother him', said the caretaker, 'Your Lord Beverbrook with your Canadian accent.' Then added the caretaker, 'Lord Beverbrook, do you know who I am?' 'No, I certainly don't,' shouted Beverbrook. Thank goodness for that,' said the caretaker and he then slammed the phone down.

I'm going to do my best telling you who I am in a request from your editor, Rev Charles whose ministry amongst you, my wife and myself admire. Some will be old enough to remember on T.V. radio years back, I will be guilty of using names of people better than me which I trust will anchor my testimony. Always may Christ be praised.

I was born in December 1948. Mum and dad had a small business near Willowfield and we lived above the shop. Baptised by Moses Thompson, minister of Mountpottinger Presbyterian, my parents constantly attended worship there.

Life Boys was followed by Boys' Brigade. David Kennedy, Captain of our 82nd Company, saw me through my Queen's badge at 15. He was a great mentor. His son worships at Trinity Bangor.

E.A. Russell followed Moses
Thompson as our minister. He was a
fabulous preacher, aggressive with
sweat on his brow. While I found him
hard to follow at 13, he later became
Professor of New Testament Greek
and my teacher for six years, this
was not so of our Assistant Minister,
Bertie Nixon. He was simple yet so
profound, Sincerity in Christ was his
trademark, he is now a member of
Bangor West.

My conversion to Christ came on 14th March 1965. J.L. Heaney now our minister tutored me on the Christian life. A fine expositor of Paul's epistles, he loved sound Keswick theology. Given a 'CALL' and encouraged by him, I was ordained a Presbyterian Minister at First Carrickfergus under Ronnie Craig the Minister.

Let me point out another Bangor West influence. When I was a student minister, Jim Hagan asked me to speak in his Banbridge Church. An Ulsterville Presbyterian nurse, June Palmer, was with me. June has been my wife 44 years now and she has been a wonderful helper especially when we were sorely tested.

Ronnie Craig told me from day one he was not a clear cut evangelical, but if I worked hard for him as his 13th assistant that would be adequate. I'll explain to you how my 4 years there were so special and that the Ronnie and David bond is still spoken about in that Church today.

Reading a Christian magazine shortly after arriving in Carrick, I took note of a David Watson, Vicar of St. Michael's, York, Beginning there with 3 elderly ladies with their dog, his church was now packed to capacity. Taking note, a few weeks later a poster appeared outside St, Anne's Cathedral stating that the special preacher at a service was the same David Watson. I went along, puzzled that nuns were in the queue to enter the Cathedral. David explained his powerful ministry for his Master was due to 'Baptism in the Holy Spirit'. June was with me and we sought and received that blessing that evening. Now what will my fellow evangelicals think of me? What will my boss Ronnie Craig say? Contacting Professor Russell, New Testament Scholar, he said 'yes, it's taught in the Scriptures.' Then other true and tested friends came my way. John Seawright, Bangor West was certainly one of those. We treasure him in our hearts. John introduced me to someone very special-David Bailie and his wife Rhoda


David had me preach at Bangor West and address young mums at their mid-week meeting. Thank you David for your inspiration. David and John are prime examples of Spirit filled men of God.

Now back in Carrick, Ronnie Craig and myself were getting closer in ministry. David Watson invited June and myself to stay with him in York and observe how he stretched the boundaries of Christ's Kingdom. Now Carrick BB and GB burst at the seams. Youth Fellowship increased 5-fold. A new congregation called Woodlands paired off our excess. I set a target of visiting 20 houses a day. Ronnie Craig now wanted to go to York and see for himself what had happened to me.

Setting out at 6.00 am for the boat to Stranraer, he drove me to Watson's home. Four days later Ronnie drove back to Carrick excited by the visit. I phoned David, asked him for a week's mission in Carrick and despite a busy programme he said 'yes!' David spoke to a very full church each night to Christians and Non Christians. My bond with Ronnie Craig was complete. Professor Russell attended with much joy. That week Ronnie received nominations for moderator, hence my 3 years at Carrick became 4 as I stayed the extra year to look after the church while he was on his trav-

I was now called to First Limavady church. David Watson was dying and I would miss Ronnie, former Irish Rugby international and leader as he became a missionary to Malawi. Some 41 people were at my first service. Films show that when I left almost 5 years later, all seats were taken. The town has many fine people and in the church I would have saints like Henry Forbes, Session Clerk and Noble Boggs, Treasurer.

The church was surrounded with a Presbyterian on my right and Roman Catholic church on my left. Sadly on my arrival the Free Presbyterian minister made it clear in a lengthy newspaper article he wanted nothing to do with me. The local editor wrote

to me from his Coleraine hospital to tell me that had he been at his desk this nasty attack would not have been printed.

A few years later a bomb blasted the roof of the Catholic church. I was angry and made my feelings known on Scene Around Six, BBC. Sadly telephone calls often with religious jargon told me I had nothing to be sorry about. These calls were nothing in comparison with what calls I received when, as the only protestant clergyman, went to the rededication of the church, presenting the friends there with a Bible. These were the dreadful early 80's and although my cousin, Major Ivan Tombs was murdered at work in his Warrenpoint Customs Office, I was a Lundy or as the Newsletter put it, 'The Papal Minister'.

The following Christmas morning, Father Kevin Mullan arrived at our church wanting to give Christmas greetings, I invited him in and 90% of my people were more than happy to receive him. He invited me over to speak to his people that festive morning and that vast gathering gave me a long, loud standing ovation. Press and TV got hold of his gesture and rolled with it for weeks. BBC London did a 40 minute documentary and with only 4 channels in those days we received over 8000 letters in support, a BBC record at that stage. At prison in Magilligan, where I was Chaplain, some 50 men professed faith in Christ on both sides. Their Governor Bob Gibson

gave me 100% support and with his phone calls still does. Constant death treats and taking rebuke on TV and the press was taking its toll on June and my 4 children, as well as myself. Former friends shunned us and would not travel in our car just in case. After one TV broadcast, a call came from Archbishop Donald Coggan. 'Thank God for your witness David', he said. He asked June and myself to stay in his home for a while. I hesitated but then agreed. His wife took June around the gardens and this Canterbury Scholar had me in his study giving me encouragement in the Scriptures. On leaving he gave me his direct line card saying you may need to leave Ulster, you have made your witness. I won't need to leave, I thought. Three months later when June was flung across the kitchen, I had enough.

Cameras followed us onto the boat. Many tears were shed by our families, the Limavady people, prisoners and by very close friends. David Bailie and John Seawright raced to Limavady as we were about to go. David had called a special Session meeting at Bangor West, John would be leaving and I would replace him as your Associate Minister! Police Officers were clear that those out to get us would not stop at Bangor and arrangements for me to study under Alaister McGrath at Oxford were completed. At Wycliffe Oxford, Nicky Gumble became a good

friend when he wasn't playing squash or out jogging, Michael Green would have me preach at the student church St. Aldates.

Where now my studies were complete, a roof over our heads due to Teddy Saunders, and a generous cheque from the Irish Catholic Church to pay all expenses. Principal Shaw placed me at the Cambridge Student Church, Holy Trinity. As a simple east Belfast man of 38 I was sure he had got it wrong in his letter to them. 'The students want you for integrity not pure academics' he told me. So off we went in fear. Our first service included a welcome from Terence O'Neil, Gerry Fitt and the arrival of Bob Gibson, new Governor of the Maze Prison. Bob gave a speech of recognition that I won't

We touched many lives in England we trust. Mission services in Liverpool, Birmingham, Bristol, Ipswich, Lowestoft and Norwich as well as Catholic Cathedrals in Nottingham, Plymouth, Brantwood and Westminster. A total of 9 Oxford Colleges and 11 Cambridge College Chapels. We have had loads of student ministers to instruct and good curates. One such is Andrew White, Vicar of Bagdad, He preached recently in Bangor West and no doubt he mentioned June and myself.

Our four children all graduated and hold high pressured jobs in Holland, London and Poland. Sarah, a Marie Curie home visiting nurse, lives in Carryduff. They broke free from the bullying they received as children due to their parents witness.

June and myself are back in Ulster. I'm preaching at a service this month marking the 150th Anniversary of Mountpottinger Presbyterian. A highlight so far was having dinner with the wonderful Bailies. We want to make Bangor West our home from mid-August because in Charles McMullen we see clear evidence of a man like Ronnie Craig. Look what happened to him. He became Moderator of course!

In this testimony may God be praised.





THANNEY PYPER'S VISION by Stephen Lennie

Thanney Pyper, a member of West, had a life-changing experience when he travelled to Cali, Colombia, last year.

e all know that you get nathan for nathan these days, so imagine how hard it is to get £55,000 for Nathan (or Thanney as he is known to us in West). Paul Bennison, who has an international prayer and healing ministry, attends our CafeChurch when he is at home. There he met Thanney and encouraged him to go on a trip to Colombia in October 2016. That's where Thanney encountered Dr Ana Elisa Bustos, an eve surgeon who runs a mission for street kids in Cali. She works with Pastor Hendrick Hoere, a pastor from the Netherlands who has been in Colombia for a long number of years and is no stranger to us in West, having preached at services here several times. The ministry has become known as the El Abrigo foundation.

Originally Dr Bustos used a building where she created a safe place for 150 children to enable them to escape the influence of drug cartels. However, there was only one toilet and one shower in the building to service everyone's needs. Paul asked Thanney to help by installing a complete suite of bathroom facilities, which would have improved conditions considerably.

Unfortunately, Thanney was to discover that the existing plumbing had been poorly installed, resulting in the foundations being washed away and leaving the building itself in a precarious state.

Instead of installing the necessary sanitary ware and improving conditions for this incredible mission, the planned work has to be abandoned and the building closed down, which left 150 kids back on the streets.

Anyone who knows Thanney realises that he is not easily beaten. In fact, he has risen to the challenge and has already made one

of three planned trips to Colombia this year. He is building a new upper floor on another building, which Hendrik has earmarked for this vital work to continue. It is also owned by the El Abrigo foundation, which means it is rent free. The space is much larger and will be able to accommodate up to 350 street kids.

To say the least, this is a challenging project with a capital requirement of £55,000. Although this sounds like an enormous total, it can be broken down to just £160 to save a child. So far. Thanney has raised approximately £29,000 and is more than half way there. His vision is to

complete the work and hand over the keys for a bespoke facility to the El Abrigo foundation in November 2017.

Not only will this be a sanctuary for the street kids, but also the lower floors will be used throughout the week to provide vocational training. At weekends the whole facility will be used as a church, bringing the Gospel to the local community in a deprived area where otherwise there would be no hope.

What is still to be done?

When Thanney returned in July, the roof was in place and work began erecting walls and securing the structure; installing Pipework and cables, as well as drainage. The internal space is to be divided to provide sleeping, cooking, washing and teaching areas, ensuring that these children will have everything they need.

Thanney is planning to make his final visit to Cali in November, when he will connect up the electrics, install the sanitary ware, fit out the kitchen and decorate the rooms ready for occupation. The completed facilities will then be handed over to Pastor Hendrick.

What has been done so far?

ery early one morning in May we set off from Stratford on the first leg of our 20 hour drive up to Thunder Bay. Before we left Stratford, Spring had definitely arrived. We'd already had the wettest April for years, so the grass was greening up nicely and all the shrubs & flowers were out on display. I think we swapped seasons with you all in Bangor, as everyone was saying how dry it was there at the time!

As we drove further north, the trees were still completely bare and the small mountain waterfalls still frozen, but the air was so clear and fresh. By the time we had driven 6 hours, Mike had spotted a black bear running through the trees. It was easy to spot as there was no surrounding vegetation. We knew to be careful at this time of year as they're always very hungry after their winter hibernation. In fact all the animals were coming out of their woodland dens in search of food ... deer and moose as well. When it comes to situation of car versus moose, the moose will always come off best!

There are many First Nation reserves dotted around both sides of the shores of the Great Lakes of Superior and Huron, and we saw quite a few families sitting around traditional teepee tents, which had fires burning strongly inside them. We didn't want to take any photos of them, as that might have seemed disrespectful, but the changing atmosphere all around us showed us that we were "coming up north". There is a difference in the northern culture, with its weather taking a

huge toll on the infrastructure of roads and buildings. People are a little more independent and pioneering in their approach to life, and there were some very inventive buildings under construction!

As we mentioned before, Carole's team have had many health issues throughout this past year, and so we spent a lot of time with those who have been particularly challenged. We were so glad to meet two new people who have recently felt a call to come on board with this ministry, and they are a "good fit" for team dynamics. Please pray that the Lord will call the right people to join with Carole, and that they will all have a united vision for the ministry.

We spent time on the streets with Carole and Jose. He and his wife originate from El Salvador and, as they say themselves, they have a lot of similarities in facial features to the First Nations' people, and find that they are received well by them. There is a deep history of victimisation and abuse inherited from the residential school system (administered by the Church), and this can affect levels of trust within the community.

Many conversations took place on the streets and the opportunities for prayer were endless. Some asked for strength to stay on their methadone programmes so that they could keep their bed allocation

in the night shelter. Others needed help with getting through the long days and coping with the monotony of street life. Shelter residents are required to stay out of the shelter between the hours of 8am and 9pm. These people have little hope of employment due to their addictions and their behavioural coping mechanisms. Many shared heartbreaking family situations as they were enjoying a hot drink and some sugarfuelled snacks supplied by the Command Post. Carole has had many donations of food and clothing given to her by various city businesses, and also by word of mouth, through family and friends. This means she is able to make this part of the ministry financially viable. However, there are still insurance and petrol bills for the vehicle and Carole covers these herself.

The deaths have been reported of four of the precious people who the team have got to know over the past year. Three of these deaths happened because of hypothermia and the effects of addiction, but one was as a result of murder.

Before we left Stratford, we had been connected with someone who had heard about RTF ministry through a friend of hers. She works in the medical field on one of the reserves in the far north, and specialises in addictions. When she isn't working on the reserve she is based in Thunder Bay, and is also involved with Teen Challenge. It was at their headquarters in the city that we met with her. It was a very blessed meeting, and mutually very encouraging. As we spoke together, she realised that the principles of our ministry of Restoring The Foundations could easily be applied to her workplace situation, and to her work with Teen Challenge as well. The connection was a good one, and looks likely to continue as the Lord leads all of us.

We were warmly welcomed when

we went to the Finnish-speaking church which we had previously attended when we came to Thunder Bay. Again good contacts were made and, as some members are going to a conference in Toronto in September, we hope to meet up with them again there. People are always so encouraged when someone from another part of Canada makes time to visit and connect with them, as life in the north can often feel like an isolating experience, especially for those who live outside of the city of Thunder Bay

On our two day drive back to Stratford we had another two bear sightings! The first one was a large male who was standing at the side of the road, only about thirty feet away from the car, separated from us by a snow ditch. We knew not to get out of the car but did manage to get a photo. Then as we kept driving further along the main road a mother and her cub ran out in front of the car! Thankfully there wasn't another vehicle on the road at that time, (especially one of those huge logging trucks that always seemed to be behind us), so we were able to slow down and stop in order to let them keep running and get safely across the road and into the woods. Total bear count four, so we were pumped!

After 10 hours of driving we again stopped in Sault St. Marie for the

night, and when we took an evening walk down to the Canal we saw three huge beavers building a massive dam. We've seen many beavers but only ever their heads bobbing on top of the water. This time one of them jumped onto a log and we saw that it was about 4 feet long with a huge tail which it slapped very loudly at us!

We count it a privilege to have been called to this nation, with its huge diversity of geography and cultures. We are always ready for travelling opportunities when they arise. 2017 is a special year for Canada, as it celebrates 150 years of becoming a Confederation, uniting its various provinces and territories.

When we are based back in our own home, and especially in the ministry room, alongside the individuals who God calls to us, we are often overwhelmed at His goodness. He allows us to be part of the deep work that He is doing in people's hearts, and that is very humbling. We really want to thank each of you for all your love and support for us, and for partnering with the Lord as He continues to supply every resource of body, soul and spirit that we need for this ministry.

INDIA **Thompson** THERE AND BACKAGAIN

s you may know a group of 6 young adults (5 girls from West, 1 guy from Ballygilbert) recently made the trip out to Mumbai to gather information about the Tearfund Connect projects that we have committed to support financially and prayerfully.

Well now we are back and wanted to give you a quick lowdown of our trip.

Firstly, we want to thank you all for supporting us before and during the trip whether that be from praying for us or supporting us financially.

Our trip started off with an early morning flight from Dublin-Dubai. then from Dubai-Mumbai. After what felt like a lifetime, we arrived in Mumbai Airport where we met Prince David and his lovely wife Anita, who became invaluable to us throughout our trip! We made our way to the YMCA which we would call home for the next nine days.


Travelling from the airport through the streets of Mumbai revealed to us that Mumbai truly is a fascinating place with a huge overwhelming amount of people, noise, traffic and smells.

Fun Fact:

Mumbai alone has a population of 18.41 million compared to the 1.811 million in the whole of Northern Ireland.

The main purpose of our trip was to see first-hand the effects of Trafficking and how our financial commitments are being used. We were able to observe this from the perspective of the women and the children.

We had opportunities to meet the women in various situations. On the

first day we visited a brothel with representatives from Oasis charity. Our team was split to avoid a large group walking around the brothel which could have been quite intimidating for the ladies. We got to meet some of the ladies living/ working in the brothel and got to

hear some of their stories.

We visited training workshops for women who have been taken out of the sex trade and want to develop their skills so they can go on and make a living for themselves. We visited a rehabilitation home which isn't directly linked to the Tearfund

Connect project, but it was really humbling to see. Here we met women as young as their 20's right the way up to ladies in their 50's who have been rescued from the sex trade and are in need of extra support. Some of these ladies needed basic training on how to read, count

to 5 and even hold a pencil. While we were spending time with these ladies we got to make bracelets, paint their nails and colour in with them. One lady spontaneously started crying and with the help of Anita, was able to tell us her story of heartache and brokenness. She shared how she wanted to die and about turning to drugs and alcohol to help ease her pain and how she eventually met someone from the programme who gave her a purpose in life and I quote, "I now feel like a Queen living under the King".

On another day we also had an opportunity to walk through a slum community to see where some of these women are living and to attend what we would call a Discipleship Group. Originally it was meant to be only a handful of women but once it started I probably counted about 40+ women either sitting in a room smaller than our Committee Room or standing outside looking through the doors. They sang a few songs for us in Hindi and then Anita shared a short devotion from the book of James. Afterwards all the women lined up and wanted us to pray for them.

Alongside meeting with women, we were also able to meet and hang out with children who either have mums who are working in the sex trade and the kids still live with them, or kids who have been brought out of their homes for their own safety. We also visited a government home (orphanage) for kids who have been abandoned by their families or their families have passed away.

We visited a girls' home and a boys' home that are run by SAHARRA—the charity that our Tearfund Connect money is directly supporting. Both homes housed

children as young as 3 years of age right the way up to 18 and this is purely because of the licencing they receive from the government. Both homes have four house parents and one head woman/man in charge. The girls' home was in better shape due to their recent move into a new building. They bought the very top floor of an apartment block and knocked down some walls to make it more open and homely. The boys' home is in need of a few repairs but that will come in due course as they have just bought another block of flats within their apartment which has enabled the older boys (18-25) to stay in the home with their own independence and privacy. The older boys have grown up in the home and feel safe there so they have decided to stay and help the house parents with the younger boys.

In both homes we were able to chat to the young people and find out a little about them such as what they wanted to do when they are older and there was a mixed bag from singers, to doctors, to preachers. Again we were able to have fun with the young people, playing various games such as monkey ball and the parachute, all of which went down a treat!

So thank you all again for embarking on this journey with us.






In Mumbai there would be a visit







A HEART TO SERVE

v name is Courtney and from September to December 2016 I completed a 10 week course on Children's Ministry at Union Theological College in Belfast. The course was all about how we as churches can make our Children's Ministry the best hour of EVERY kid's week. Each week a different tutor came in and delivered a fun and interactive presentation. The topics ranged from Learning Styles, **Family Connection, Creative Bible** communication, Managing the Chaos and sessions on how we can allow the children to respond.

If you were to ask me what the best session was, I would have to say all of them as they each brought more and more important information to the course. The Learning Styles' session was great as Rev David Bruce talked about various methods of learning. He got us to identify our own learning style as he said usually this will be the way we teach. He then went on to explain that we need to be cautious of using only our own learning style to teach, as for many kids that is not how they will learn and some kids will switch off. We need to be adaptable with how we teach and deliver.

It became really beneficial for me during the Creative Bible Communication session which was delivered by Leanne Dunlop. We looked at how we can adapt our programmes or lessons to make them fun and interactive with a mixture of different teaching styles so that every single child would be able to get involved and take something away that day.

Every week we were asked to read a chapter of a book and write a short 200 word summary. This is based around Willow Creek Church in America. It was really informative and made you think about whether we, in our own churches, are doing the best we can when it comes to Children's Ministry.

Finally, to complete the course, we

were asked to reflect on the course and write about one area of Children's Ministry in our church that we would like to see developed. Seeing as I have a passion to work with young people with additional needs, I wrote about trying to bridge the gap between additional needs kids and the church. Although West has a foot in the door regarding this with Little Acorns, Special friends and with our link with Clifton, I believe that we could be doing so much more.

Children play a vital role in our church and this course has opened

my eyes to the many ways in which we can talk about God in a fun and interactive way, allowing them to grow up as kids but also equipping them to grow up loving to come to church and to love Jesus.

This is a really brief summary of the course, so if you've any questions feel free to find me in church and ask. BUT if you have a heart to serve within Children's Ministry or are keen to take this course, speak to Sonia Mawhinney (I'm sure she won't mind pointing you in the right direction!).



AN EYE OPENING EXPERIENCE

fter a year of fundraising and pestering loved ones. acquaintances and everyone else we know to support us, on the 10th July we finally began our journey to Entebbe to begin our trip to Uganda. We are part of a team of 15 heading out with the charity Abaana. We were working at a number of the different projects that had been set up by the charity. During the 17 days we spent in Uganda we saw a number of different aspects of what life is like for people living in poverty, particularly children, and it's our hope that we were able to share something with the people we came across to show God's love and compassion for them and practically use the skills God has given us to help them out in whatever way we could.

We both made a decision to be part of this team for a number of different reasons. Harry has been interning with Abaana this past year and had previously been out with a team five years ago with the intention of returning, so when the opportunity arose to go this summer he jumped at the chance. Ever since he went out the first time he has felt God gave him a real heart for Uganda and a passion to fight against poverty, which we were part of on this trip. Jordan on the other hand has never been before, with Keady being the furthest he has ventured on mission, but he felt a strong desire to go further afield. After taking part in the Abaana sleepout in December and learning of all the amazing work that Abaana does to fight injustice and poverty in Uganda, when he heard there was a team going out this summer he knew he wanted to be a part of it. city but also for millions across the world. We ran a programme for these kids to provide them with food, share God's Word and just show them love and compassion by being there with them. We talked to them and listened to their heart-breaking stories of how they ended up on the streets.

We also got to see a more uplifting side to the story of street children in Uganda when we visited the Abaana New Life Homes, where children who had previously been living on the street had now been re-homed and given education. We ran a schools' programme for them and saw how life can be turned around for the street children.

We also travelled to Gulu, a rural area near the border of South Sudan which had previously been ravaged by the LRA (Lord's Resistance Army or sometimes Movement) where we took part in a building project at Ayila Primary School to help build accommodation for teachers. This project means that better qualified teachers will come to the school



Francis and I would love to welcome you to our Coffee Morning in support of our ongoing work with the Streetboys of Isiolo, Kenya and our first big project with them.

Why should I support another mission?

We understand that it can often be overwhelming when deciding what area of God's work to support. It's maybe even a little frustrating with so much need across the world and so many missions and charities that all ask for your support - don't worry we have all been there & we understand! Pray and support whatever God has filled your heart with compassion for. It's so important you feel appreciated, involved and passionate about whatever you choose to support. We felt it was time to hold a fundraiser in the church since beginning this journey because this is our first big project and we really want to keep brothers and sisters in Christ involved in this area of God's work. right from the beginning! We are the missionaries on the ground in this case, but you are the missionary from home, you're vital to this area of God's work and we really want a relationship with you. The streetboys that we work with know that Francis and I love them, but our boys need to know that they have a family in Christ who loves them too and that God loves them most! This is a huge part of their journey to finding freedom through Christ.

Who are we?

For those who did not get a chance to read my last article in West Life, my fiancé Francis, (husband by the time you read this), and I have been independently providing drug rehabilitation, food, medical care, clothes, washing facilities, homeschool educational support and most importantly shining the light of Jesus into the lives of the streetboys in our area whom we love very much. (Come to our coffee morning for more info on this and pick up a newsletter. We would love to show you how we've spent donations up to this point & how to pray for this work.)

My husband, Francis lives in Kenya full time. He is Kenyan, was born into the Turkana tribe (the same tribe as a huge amount of the street-boys) and born into the community that we currently live and work in. I have been travelling between Kenya and N.I because of university commitments, however it's finally time for me to move permanently to Kenya this summer.

So, what will the Coffee Morning support?.. WE ARE BUILDING!

We're at the next stage of this work and it is extremely difficult to take the 'street' out of the boys without taking them physically off the streets. We are currently making preparations to build and register so that the street-boys can come to live full time with Francis and I as part of our family and local community - this will allow them to escape all they fall victim to while sleeping on the streets. We are doing things a bit differently. As a result of our experience we find that due to the unique challenges they face, with violence, special educational needs and extreme addictions, streetboys rarely do well when they are placed in children's home style setups except in very rare cases

where they haven't spent much time on the streets before they're found. They are very different from other poor and vulnerable chil-



dren you often see on TV. These boys need to be placed within small family style cluster homes and that is part of the vision. They are rejected by society and we need to allow them to live amongst their tribes in order for any positive community reintegration to occur. We do not want to westernise these boys they are African and need to live with and around people that speak their language and understand their circumstances. The boys need oneto-one attention and guidance and they cannot get that in larger style homes where they may feel institutionalised, forgotten and not many know how to help with their addictions - eventually they end up returning to street-gangs. Many of them are desperate to be shown the love of Christ by a family who loves them for who they are and we are so excited to start having the boys live with us full time! However... it seems that something is missing.

We have been personally saving and fundraising to begin building and furnishing the boys' bedrooms. Any additional funds raised will go towards our ongoing costs for the boys daily needs. We are also keen to build up prayer support.

Our house at present is a mud floor, no electricity, kitchen, security for space for the boys—just a 3m² wooden room with a bed, buckets and some African ants! (See above)

ake Garda is regarded as one of the most beautiful regions in Europe with stunning scenery that is enjoyed by many holidaymakers each year.

The majority of people will visit the south of the lake with its well known resorts such as Garda. Desenzano and Bardolino. However, the less visited northern half of the lake, with its more mountainous scenery, is equally if not more stunning. This area was, until the end of World War I, part of the Austro-Hungarian Empire and some parts feel much more Austrian than Italian.



Some basics, the transfer to get here is longer as the main airport that most people use, Verona, is closer to the Southern resorts. We stayed in Riva and the transfer took 1 hour 45 minutes, however as most of the journey was along the shores of Lake Garda, it was a very pleasant way to start the holiday. Our return journey took a faster less scenic route, initially through the mountains and then down the motorway to Verona Airport.

There are 4 main resorts on the Northern Lake:

- Riva, where we stayed
- Limone, on the Western
- Torbole, a small town east of
- Malcesine, further down the eastern shore

Each of these has its own character and all provide excellent opportunities for holiday makers. All areas are linked to each other by a local bus service or via the public or private ferries around the lake.

Riva

This is the largest town in the area and has a full range of shops, hotels and any facilities that you will need. It is spread out along the lake side with pleasant promenades and

cycle paths, not hilly, for people to enjoy leisurely strolls beside the magnificent scenery. The town has high mountains to the north which set beside the lake makes for stun-

ning vistas.

The old town has many cafes and restaurants, many set along the lake and are great places to have a leisurely lunch, enjoy the view and watch the world go past. This area has lots of shops with everything from holiday souvenirs to designer goods. The ferries to and from the town also depart from here.

For the more active there are lots of activities including mountain biking, sailing and wind surfing. The waterfall at Varone is worth a visit, tip don't walk as we did, get the bus! It is a lot further away than you would expect but well worth the visit.

Limone

This is a beautiful town set close to the lake shore and with the mountains close behind provides a stunning vista.

The heart of the old town is the little harbour, the Porto Vecchio. From here, narrow lanes lined with tourist shops wind along the shore and up the slopes behind. There are pleasant and picturesque waterfront terraces, and plenty of places to eat and drink while admiring lake views. Following paths to the north of the harbour you leave the hustle and bustle behind, and pass scattered hotels, peaceful cafe terraces, abandoned lemon groves and little swimming beaches.

In the other direction is the more modern part of Limone: a wide waterfront promenade, car park and many more hotel developments. This end of the town sprawls over the area where the mountains are set back further from the lake: here olive groves are interspersed with hotels and swimming pools.

The town can be accessed by bus from any of the local towns but a better way is to take one of the many ferries from any of the local towns and enjoy the great views along the lake.

> Malcesine's most striking feature as you approach over Lake Garda is its historic castle, the Castello Scaligero, which is also the town's main tourist attraction. This is also used for weddings and a lot of UK couples get married here in these beautiful surroundings.

To the south of town a pleasant lakeside promenade meanders past hotels, cafes and bathing spots to a little headland which boasts a couple of 'beach' establishments. There is a footpath and cycling path around the lake. A cableway runs from Malcesine up to the high mountain ridge behind the town to Monte Baldo. This is a great excursion, particularly on a hot day, as temperatures are lower. The views are also stunning across the whole of the northern lake. As you exit the cable-car station a panoramic path leads to a lovely viewpoint about twenty minutes' easy walk away.

The cable-cars get busy so you should be prepared for queues.

So would I go back to Lake Gar-

Without a question, this is one of the nicest areas I have ever visited.

The one downside....too many gelato ice creams with easy access!

DIARY EXTRACT...

his was written in 2011.

Jim read these words in 2013 after a row in which he accused me of not making allowances for his cancer.

Today 12 June 2008 the appointment came for Jim to have a whole body isotobe scan. This will show what has happened since 5 years ago when "hot spots" were found in his pelvis and spine. We don't talk much of the cancer. Jim lives life to the full. "When it spreads to the liver, I'll know when I turn yellow," he said. "Hard to see if you're tanned," I said.

I pray often for the tumour to shrink and the spread to stop, the damage to be healed.

"Do you pray?"
"Yes, today," Jim said.


Dear God, please shrink the tumour and stop the spread - this prayer I have prayed many, many times. Jesus said "Ask and you will receive. If a son asks his father for fish will his father give him a stone? Not so. Your heavenly Father will hear your need."

After Jim's chemo treatment, his PSA level was drastically lowered. Then it went up and I thought oh no and he bore that treatment so bravely and it hasn't worked.

So I prayed that God would again shrink the tumour, stop the spread and this time give me a sign. I promised to tell everyone if this was granted.

It was. The PSA level went down drastically. And do you know what I did about my promise? NOTHING! I simply forgot what I had promised.

I was depressed in February 2011. It was an effort to get out of bed each morning and start the day. I just wanted to stay curled in the warmth and not to have to get up and function, I found it helped to put out my clothes each night—otherwise I simply couldn't choose what to wear. I found it difficult to shop. I would freeze with indecision. I didn't feel hungry and was a reluctant cook; what to cook, what to buy—big



problem. My weight dropped to 7 stone

I didn't want to go out, phone or talk to friends but I made myself do this

I developed eczema on my face, red itchy patches and felt I looked a sight. My lips reacted to lipscreen and peeled for 10 weeks. My tongue reacted to mouthwash, toothpaste, white wine, curry etc. with deep cuts.

I felt surrounded by cancer.

Our neighbour, Mr Smith, my good friend—her husband Bert, my Jim, Nina—Louise's friends, Victor in Larne. I was in a dark place. I lost God.

Michael, our elder son went to Tokyo on the 6th March to work for 1 month. He is normally based in Singapore. We talked on the evening before the earthquake that destroyed the Nuclear Power Station.

Next morning I woke, turned on the news and was shocked to learn of the disaster.

Michael phoned our younger son Peter and he phoned us at 8.30 am to tell us Michael was alright. But for 2 days (until we skyped) I was constantly listening/watching news on radio, TV, computer. I shook with

I was depressed before Tokyo news. Why? Looking back I think my friend's husband's illness brought forcefully to me the devastation that cancer can bring. Then one day I woke up and suddenly remembered my promise. I felt just as St. Peter must have felt when the cock crowed thrice and he had denied knowing Jesus. He wept.

Dear God, thank you for the years given to Jim after the diagnosis in 2003. Thank you for the 2 lovely grandsons, now 15 and 10 years old who have distracted us from sad thoughts and kept us busy. Thank you for the quality of life which Jim has enjoyed:- his energy and purpose to love each day, keep occupied and busy. Thank you for the lovely holidays we have enjoyed in Singapore, Canada, America, Spain, France, Italy and here in Ireland. Thank you for our friends, his motorbike rides, our train journeys, coffee & meals out.

Just after forwarding this article for inclusion in this magazine, Jim sadly lost his battle on 9th July.



SEEK TO SERVE

wonder if you are any good at mental arithmetic? If you are anything like me you may be a little rusty in this regard. One of the ways we often need to use mental arithmetic is if we are trying to convert a value from one kind of unit to another. I'm in awe of people who can convert from Celsius to Fahrenheit or from miles to kilometres at the drop of a hat. It takes me a little longer and often with the use of a calculator! OK, who am I kidding? I always need a calculator!

I was overjoyed recently to discover an app for my smartphone which is dedicated to converting between a wide range of different units. You want to convert something from inches to millimetres? No problem! Miles to kilometres? Easy peasy! Stones and pounds to kilograms? It's all just a finger click away! Those conversions that used to be so taxing are now a breeze.

The number of different ways of measuring units can lead to confusion and mix up in many areas of our lives, because let's face it, there are differing ways to measure anything. I want to suggest that this befuddlement caused by units can even lead to confusion and misunderstanding in our role as disciples of Jesus Christ. What unit of measurement do we use, for example, to define the scope of how we share the love of Jesus with the world?

We could define this as *the individual*, and say that it is all about each individual Christian sharing God's love with those people they interact with. Or we could define this as *the family*. Should each family be our focus for expressing God's love? Or should we be thinking about *small groups*, or *special interest groups* or is it about us as a *congregation* sharing God's love? Or is it as a *denomination* across the island of Ireland?

Well, I'm really struck by the idea

that when Jesus gives the great commission to His disciples, He entrusts this ragtag group of followers with the task of making His love known across the globe, and the smallest unit of measurement He uses is a city!

Jesus says:

"You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you. And you will be my witnesses, telling people about me everywhere—in Jerusalem, throughout Judea, in Samaria, and to the end of the earth." (Acts 1:8 NLT)

So we're not called to come to church, we're called to **be the church**, and to take ownership of Jesus' mission in this world. He wants us to tell others about His love and we need to calibrate our vision for how we do this by setting our smallest unit of measurement as a city, which in our case would be Bangor.

So how do we begin to impact our city or our town with the love of Jesus?

Well, one of the ways we have been attempting to do this has been

through the "Street by Street" initiative in partnership with our neighbouring congregations of Carnalea Methodist Church and St. Galls.

Every fortnight since January, a specific street in our community has become the focus of a combined prayer initiative across all three congregations. A group of seven people made up from all three participating churches have been going street by street and door by door to let the residents know that we are praying for their street and ask if they would like us to pray for anything they are facing. These prayer requests are then prayed for by the 'street by street' team.

I have found this to be both a positive and challenging experience. It is great to hear stories coming back from the team about lives impacted by the fact that somebody is willing to pray for them. One man I called with was on the verge of tears at the thought of us praying into the brokenness of his situation. And we have had children attending the Easter Mission as a direct result of contact made by the 'street by street' team.

But if I am honest, I am also challenged by the reality that for every home that welcomed prayer there

were those who declined.
Some folks politely declined the offer of prayer but the ones that stick in my memory are the individuals who visibly recoiled at the prospect of prayer so I guess it has been a real eye opener to me of how there is an increasing gap between what we do

as a congregation and the people in the immediate community we seek to serve. It would be all too easy for us to get lost in our own wee churchy bubble and enjoy coming to church, and ignore the challenge to be the church. If our smallest unit of measurement for

our mission is the *city*, then I suggest that team we need to achieve this also needs to be recalibrated. The smallest unit of measurement to define the team we need to impact this community needs to be bigger than the "Street by Street" team. It needs to be *the church*. We all need to step into this calling.

Please pray for this initiative as it progresses 'street by street' across our community. Pray for the residents to experience God's love amidst whatever challenges they are facing. Consider being part of the team but let's recognise that this is just the tip of the iceberg. If you are a follower of Jesus, then you are automatically a member of the great commission team. So let's step into this challenge and ask God to equip us to make an impact in our community as we share God's love. Let us recalibrate our measurements and focus on the city!
