

#RUNREVRUN

ou have to be very careful what you say, particularly in an age of political spin and alternative facts. It all began in a sermon aside one Sunday morning at the 11.30 service when I mentioned that on the gym treadmill I can run 5k in a time of 22 minutes 19 seconds!

The immediate response was a round of applause and gasps of amazement. I could sense that some of you were truly amazed, given that the combined age of my legs has now reached well over a hundred. There was also a potential crisis of belief with it now being called into question if everything said at the front of West Church was, strictly speaking, true.

Helen Byers decided to put it all to the test on Facebook by challenging me to register for the Bangor park run and have my 5k officially timed. Well, panic is beginning to set in! You see, it's all very easy in an air-conditioned gym, enjoying my own company and following a familiar routine, but what if I were to be overcome by the drama of the moment, have a nasty fall or be mauled by the park ducks? Would there need to be a cardiac ambulance on stand-by? Or would the sight of the minister's legs be too much for some?

A petition has been gathering apace, accompanied by all kinds of help-ful(!) comments. Here are some of my favourites:

#runrevrun;

"I'm backing Charles all the way, especially if he says no! LOL - I'm feeling the pressure!"

"C'mon Charles McMullen. Show them what you are made of. Get Barbara to do it too!"

It's this next comment. however, that has really pressed all the right psychological buttons and somehow got under my skin: "There's coffee and buns after park run, Charles! You know you want to! It's all about community....and leadership." Not only is an appeal being made here to the weakness of my sweet tooth, but also to my sense of duty and responsibility.....

Paul wrote these

encouraging words to the Corinthians: "Do you not know that in a race all the runners run, but only one gets the prize? Run in such a way to get the prize. Everyone who competes in the games goes into strict training. They do it to get a crown that will not last; but we do it to get a crown that will last forever" (1 Corinthians 9:24-25)


Who better to quote than Eric Liddell, the famous Scottish missionary of "Chariots of Fire" fame, who participated in the 1924 Summer Olympics in Paris? The sacrifice for him was declining to run in the 100m heats, because they were held on a Sunday. Instead he went on to win gold in the 400metres.

He said four things that are noteworthy: (i) "Many of us are missing something important in life because we are after the second best"

(ii) It has been a wonderful experience to compete in the Olympic games and to bring home a gold medal. But since I have been a young lad, I have had my eyes on a different prize. You see, each one of us is in a greater race than any I have run in Paris, and this race ends when God gives out the medals."

(iii) "You will know as much of God, and only as much of God, as you are willing to put into practice."

(iv) God made me fast. And when I run, I feel His pleasure."



Whether there will be chariots of fire or the sense of running for pleasure in the Bangor park run I do no know, but Liddell reminds me of the incredible joys and challenges of the Christian life.

HOLY WEEK 2017 Jesus' Journey



We are delighted to be uniting again with our friends at St Gall's Church of Ireland and Carnalea Methodist for a week of services. Our speaker, Stephen Connolly, has been an Anglian Diocesan Reader in the Church of Ireland Diocese of Down and Dromore since 1995 and is a parishioner of St. John's Church, Helen's Bay. He was a teacher in Belfast and then, for 12 years, Headmaster of Bangor Grammar School, retiring in December 2013. (He is now the Chief Executive of AQE, the company which supplies one of the transfer tests for admission to grammar schools.) In his talks during Holy Week, he will follow Jesus's journey from place to place: along the road to Jerusalem and Bethany, the home of Mary, Martha and Lazarus; from the olive grove in the Kidron Valley to the Governor's palace; and from there, inevitably, to Golgotha. Along that path, in each place, he will focus on a question asked in the story, questions which shock, provoke and inspire.

With our action teams meeting every other month as break out groups from the main Kirk Session meeting, the team leaders have provided you with a short update on how their particular team is moving forward.


Worship

One of the finest definitions of worship was given in the last century by William Temple, former Archbishop of Canterbury, who said: "To worship is to quicken the conscience by the holiness of God, to feed the mind with the truth of God, to purge the imagination by the beauty of God, to open the heart to the love of God, to devote the will to the purpose of God."

We might also want to quote the Shorter Catechism of our Presbyterian Church: "Man's chief end is to glorify God and to enjoy Him forever"

Worship involves not only every aspect of our services as we gather together on Sundays, but also the daily offering of our lives. As Paul writes: "Therefore, I urge you, brothers, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God—this is your spiritual act of worship."

In West we have a wide variety of people and worship styles. There is the informality and intimacy of





CafeChurch as well as traditional and contemporary styles of praise. There is the importance of our prayer life as well as our response to the preaching of God's Word and prayer ministry. Silence can be just as meaningful as the clashing of cymbals. Familiar liturgy offers stability and continuity in a sea of change so characteristic of the frenzied pace of modern life. How can we also be creative and innovative in our worship, responding to the leading and prompting of the Spirit of God? Creating space for orchestras (Psalm 150) as well as following spontaneously as we sing psalms, hymns and spiritual songs (Colossians 3) - how amazing it is that God should give us the gift and privilege of worship. Grace, generosity and gratitude are so central to our worship. Above all, we want to bring Jesus Christ to the centre of

Atmospherics can affect our worship experience—the warmth of the welcome we receive when we arrive or the way we reach out to those sitting around us; the quality of the sound and projection of voices; the temperature of the room; the various experiences we bring to Church as well as our personal attitudes and preferences.

The Worship Action team has gathered representatives from the praise teams, choir, sound and technical departments. As a group our desire is to listen to each other, to bless and affirm one another, as we look to God to help us plan for the future.

Discipleship

Our team of nine meets every other month. Two members have attended a series of discipleship workshops run by PCI while another two are completing a course on discipleship run by the CS Lewis Institute.

Our key responsibilities are:

- (i) to support the members of West develop through from Membership, Ministry and Mission and to underline the importance of doing so;
- (ii) to develop a strategy and development plan for Discipleship within West Church:
- (iii) to provide training and teaching with external support as required;
- (iv) to review and evaluate how Discipleship is being carried out within the church and the set of priorities for the next year; and
- (v) to provide as far as possible, the resources to enable members to grow as disciples.


In other words, we are tasked to assist our church in walking more closely in the footsteps of Jesus, listening to His voice and allowing His spirit to shape our thinking and our actions.

When Paul wrote his second letter to Christian people in Corinth, he told them, 'You yourselves are our letter, written on our hearts, known and read by everyone. You show that you are a letter from Christ, the result of our ministry, written not with ink but with the Spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone but on tablets of human hearts.' (2 Cor. 3:2-3)

Do you see yourself as a letter from Jesus to others, known and read by everyone? This is the reality and the calling of all disciples. So how do we do this? Paul goes on to talk about competence, or the ability to follow through on our calling. Our character must be matched by God given and spirit-shaped competence. This is when we start to 'grow and flourish' as disciples and

become the attractive and authentic letter that Paul is talking about.

Our action team is working on both of these key aspects.



Christian character formation determined by our heart's desire being shaped by God's word. We have encouraged this growth and illustrated how it

takes place through the SOAP (Study, Observe li.e. ponder its meaning], Apply and Pray) approach to reading our Bibles (check it out in the 'Resources' on our new fabulous West website). Sunday evenings have consequently taken a different shape over the past three months when we have introduced 'SOAP" and grappled together in small groups with the associated teaching from the pulpit. Participants have really enjoyed the sessions and appreciated talking with and listening to others who, like them, are seeking to follow Jesus closely. It is only when we spend time with other Christians that the possibility of being shaped and mentored by one another starts to become a reality.

Our team is also working to equip our Home or Small Groups with resources that are designed to build on the Sunday sermons and challenge us to make our response more specific and active. These studies are also available on the Church website.

Our team would love to see more of West's members, of whatever age, linking with a small group. In these groups, we are inspired when we share our own stories of how it is to follow Jesus in the office, or canteen, or business, or classroom, or wherever we love out our calling to be disciples and imitators of Christ.

Bible teaching and praying together helps us to grow. We would also love to see each group identify some areas of mission or service to which the members could contribute together.

At another level, the Action Team is considering how mentoring (a more mature Christian meeting with a younger Christian group of Christians) can take shape in our church family. We are looking at practical resources such as 'Just for Starters' from the Good Book

Company and Transforming Discipleship by Greg Ogden. We feel that these various steps need to be tailored appropriately to encourage for example, those who have recently come to

faith through Alpha or through CafeChurch or those who are transitioning from Young West or those who are simply keen to grow in their faith.

I wonder if you have ever stopped

and asked yourself the question: "Why do I attend church?" or maybe "What's all this really about?". Those are big questions that we could all wrestle with. And maybe we could all bring slightly different answers to the table if we were to answer those questions honestly. But imagine for a moment if we were to put those questions directly to Jesus. What purpose would he give for us meeting together? What would he tell us church was 'all about'?

I co-convene the Mission and Outreach session sub-group at West Church, and we believe our mandate springs from Jesus' heart for the church. We see on the pages of the New Testament clear evidence that Jesus wants the church to exist not for the benefit of it's members but for the benefit of non-members.

After Jesus had risen from the grave that first Easter he met with his followers and famously gave them a bold mission that we call "The Great Commission". And of course we all know that the great commission commands us to "go into all the earth and make church members". Wait a minute. Did I get that right? Maybe it was "Go into all the world and start church organisations and ministries?" Does that sound right?

Hang on. It turns out neither of those are right. Jesus' singular mission statement for His church was that they were to "go into all the world and make disciples".



So Jesus' vision for the church is all about mission. We are to be disciples who are actively involved in making other disciples. That's so much more than just being church attendees! In fact, when you think about it like that, it's quite a challenging and uncomfortable thought!

So the Mission and Outreach
Team are determined to mobilise the
congregation of West Church Bangor to engage in God's mission. We
want to champion the cause of mission and outreach and facilitate
members of the congregation in connecting with missional opportunities.

Pastoral Care

The various action teams mentioned in a previous West Life magazine are now operational, and for us on the Pastoral Care Action Team (PCAT for short), we are delighted to have the input of the additional elders who have joined the already existing structure. The PCAT encompasses such a wide variety of ministries that it would be impossible to mention everything in a short article like this, so let's look briefly at some aspects of this vital aspect of church life...

(i) This past year it has been a blessing to see the senior lunches develop and grow. These are for seniors who live alone with little or no family support. We've had to start small, but are happy to expand and include more people, and

we are open to suggestions as to

who could be invited in line with

these criteria.

(ii) The Newcomers' Welcome Corner, led by Ronnie and Margaret Matthews, has increased to twice a month and plans are underway to make it every week. You've undoubtedly noticed the turquoise polo shirts that the team wear while on duty and the lovely cups reserved for the newcomers passing through! We have a new church handbook, "Welcome to West", filled with information about West Church that we will give to newcomers to help them learn about who and what West Church is. This ministry has led to a number of people becoming new church members, who are lovingly welcomed into membership by church elder Jane Richardson visiting them and presenting them with a nice plant.

(iii) The Senior Care Team, led by Carol Davis, has grown to include new visitors and new visitees. Our elderly folk who are unable to get to church easily are very important to us and deserve our loving care. Each time there is communion at church, our plan is to have a communion service for those for whom attendance on a Sunday is difficult. Communion is also available for those who request it at home.

(iv) DivorceCare and GriefShare continue under the able leadership of Dorothy Campbell and Anne Andrews respectively. Anne will soon be stepping down after decades of good and faithful service, to be replaced by other excellent leaders. Well done Anne! And thank you for such sterling work!

There are many other activities that come under the umbrella of pastoral care in the way that they provide wonderful opportunities for people to gather for fellowship and mutual support. All play their part in integrating individuals into the church family. Just have a look at the wave chart on the back wall of the welcome area, and you will see how many such activities exist!

At our most recent PCAT meeting in February, we were reminded how greatly blessed we are at West Church to have so many devoted, talented and faithful volunteers involved in such a diversity of ministries. There isn't enough room in this article to mention you all by name, but on behalf of the church's

pastoral staff, may I thank you most sincerely for all that you do in the service of others. We are so grateful too for the wonderful logistical support given by the West Church office staff and caretakers. Great stuff guys, thanks!



I think the words American President John F Kennedy spoke in his inaugural address are most appropriate here: 'Ask not what your country can do for you, ask what you can do for your country.' Our many pastoral care volunteers have applied these words to their service within the church. But there is room for many more church members to be involved! Schools Ministry

January and February have been exceptionally busy months for the team in our primary schools ministry. We have had the privilege of teaching P3, P4 and P6 Scripture Union lessons, leading school assemblies and a weekly SU after schools club. This provides a wonderful opportunity to make connections with children and teachers.

An overnight lock in has been planned at the end of June for the P7 children from our local primary schools to come into West and enjoy our Saturday night Wyldlife programme. This has been a great way in the past to develop links with children who have no connections with West Church.



J Club

Each week the children in J Club bring their collection and we give this to various missions and projects. In December we were excited to welcome Holly Eves in J Club and present her with a cheque for £520 for Meninadanca Brazil. Our next collection will go towards supporting Elliot Gray as he goes to Tanzania with Compassion UK.

We are also looking for two new adult leaders to help out in our preschool ministry on a Sunday morning. This involves being on a rota one month on, one month off. We want people who enjoy being with little ones, helping them settle into the class, playing with them during free time, encouraging them with


their singing and listening to a Bible story. If you would be interested in serving in this area, please speak to one of the leaders in Junior Beginners or to Sonia.

n the 13th September 2016 we began our preparations for running an Alpha course in West by participating in Alpha Prayer Live. This was an event that connected churches all over the UK who were preparing to run Alpha in a live-streamed prayer event over the internet.

We followed this up with team training, and then on Monday 26th September we kicked off an 11 week Alpha course meeting in the Welcome area at West Church.


The welcome area proved to be a great venue to host Alpha in, and we had four large discussion groups meeting, often watching episodes from the new Alpha Film Series not the big screen. Discussions were great, and many found the course to be a faith stimulating experience. Here are a few stories from participants.

I had heard the Alpha course mentioned too many times not to be curious. I signed up but had no idea really what to expect.

Feeling defensive and a little nervous, I made my way to West Church for the first session. I had a lot of doubts and I was armed with a tonne of questions. As I stepped through the doors of the welcome area, I found myself met by the aroma of coffee and an abundance of chatter and friendliness. There were even a few familiar faces.

Each week we would watch a video and then split into groups for discussion. I was not a Christian and I was always determined to ask as many questions as possible. The group were attentive as we each shared our views and talked, nobody was judgemental.



After the third week, I found myself really looking forward to Alpha. I was learning so much about Jesus. When we reached the episode, "How can I be filled with the Holy Spirit," my life changed com-

pletely. We had all watched some Alpha videos and enjoyed an amazing lunch together before gathering to listen to Rev. Charles McMullan. Afterwards there was an opportunity for prayer. Paul and Jane Simms asked if they could pray for me. They prayed that I would be filled with the Holy Spirit. It was a very emotional experience and when they had finished, Jane gave me what I can only describe as the warmest hug I have ever had. I went home and prayed. I thanked the Lord for all the amazin my life and all that I have. I asked for my sins to be forgiven. In that moment, I realised that Jesus was with me and always had been. I felt so humbled.


In the New Year we were given the green light by the Mission and Outreach Session Sub-team to take the Alpha course out of the church building and experiment with running it in a local pub. So what exactly is it going to look like?





CONGREGATIONAL COMMITTEE REPORT

ur Congregational Church Committee meets every second month on the third Monday and it is in place to administer the temporal affairs of the congregation, as well as administering all funds belonging to the congregation, administering Church property, regulating how the Church premises, halls and rooms are used, providing the interested of the Central Funds and Mission of the Church, coordinating communications, complying with Health & Safety, assisting with Personnel and Staffing issues and organising Hospitality.

If you ask a Committee Chair they may well say as the joke goes, "Any Committee that is in the slightest way useful is composed of people who are too busy to want to sit on it for a second longer than they have to". That is perhaps a little harsh and I know from personal experience in West, serving on an effectively run Committee can be rewarding and there are potential riches to be gained from the array of experience, expertise and insights around the table.

To steal another quote, "A Committee is a group of people who can do nothing but as a group decide that nothing can be done". Many a true word has been said in jest but bearing in mind our growing congregation and the pressure on available space and resources, we must not let this be said of us at West. With this in mind, and to encourage forward thinking and a proactive ethos, we have in recent years successfully structured our Committee into 4 key areas.

- 1) Finance
- 2) Property/Health & Safety
- 3) Hospitality and Catering
- 4) Communications



The purpose of these groups is to provide a more accountable, integrated and cohesive structure, designed to achieve agreed objec-

Our Treasurer Victor Stephens, along with John Poole, our Gift Aid Convener, have continued their time consuming collation of our financial records and their excellent attention to detail is fundamental in ensuring the proper functioning and planning for the congregational needs. Typically Victor gives an overview of our accounts at the opening of each Committee meeting and provides a comparison of their standing to the previous year. As a Committee we are conscious of living within our means and we have always strived to ensure that we demonstrate proper stewardship of our finances. The overseeing of Church Finances is often onerous and carries with it not a little responsibility and with this in mind it is always good to look at the lighter side of this crucial area.

Three boys are in the school yard bragging about their fathers. The first boy says, "my Dad scribbles a few words on a piece of paper, he calls it a poem and they give him £25.00".

The second boy says, "that's nothing, my Dad scribbles a few words on a piece of paper, he calls it a song and they give him £200.00".

The Finance Sub-Group, under the guidance of Jeremy Eves, further enhances the



prudent management of our finances. In 2016 they diligently dealt with such issues as ongoing expenditure cont'd on page 18

to our bungalow (93 Crawfordsburn Road), the Manse, the escalation of the congregation's use of Standing Orders/Direct Debits, not to mention overseeing the increase of income for operational issues.



The area of property is very comprehensive and we are blessed to rely on the expertise of Brian McVeigh who heads up this team. Each month this sub-committee evaluates the many requests for accommodation from external groups and balances the requests for hall and room allocations against the many and varied internal groups and organisations. In 2016, the subcommittee was heavily engaged in supplementary building works at '93' and over and beyond this addressed general church building issues such as water ingress, carpet cleaning, repainting, floor varnishing, furniture repair and damaged windows.



The Property sub-committee is closely flanked and complimented by the Health & Safety sub-committee, a specialised team headed up by Stephen Cully.

Question: How many Health & Safety Officers does it take to change a light bulb?

Answer: One, and the rest of the world to pander around him. Only joking Stephen!

I am delighted that this is not our experience here in West where the sub-committee provides informed advice and guidance and helps harness this complex area with the aid of specialised guest speakers, assessments, training and the implementation of compliance and standards. Moreover, the area of Fire Risk Assessment, evacuations and the introduction and training of Fire Wardens is always ongoing.

When considering the signage on our extension building, "Serving Christ Serving Others", the role of our



Communication's Sub-committee becomes all the more vital. Indeed the whole area of communication is key to our witness and we want to ensure that we are portraying the correct message.

The story goes that some weeks ago, Cheryl Miller from our office, was carrying out some administration and found a local tile shop signed for by someone called Christian. Pretty sure that nobody had ordered or purchased tiles, Cheryl called the shop to point out the mistake. "I'm sorry", she told the manager, "but there are no Christians here at West Church". Under the guidance of Stephen Cully, in 2016, the Sub-committee has continued to harness our West Life magazine which Cheryl Miller marvellously oversees. Fundamentally however, most of the year was spent researching and investigating how best to modernise our Church website. I am glad to say that with the help of some external professional advice, the website has been completely rewritten and is now up to date with a strong photographic content professionally provided by one of our Young West members, Curtis Irvine, and importantly gives a good platform for the future. It was launched just prior to Christmas and any feedback is welcome. (see page 34)

In conclusion, the sub-group, towards the end of the year, began to concentrate on a complete rebrand of literature to compliment our Church logo and as directed by Kirk Session, consideration of how to best make the Values of the church more prominent and visible are presently being expedited.

HOSPITALITY TEAM

Equally important, a much expanding ministry and pastoral tool here in West is that of Hospitality and over the past 22 years we have been blessed with the services of Linda Cummings and her team in this area.

Our sub-committee creates expense plans for Church functions and manage catering requests from within West and from external groups. These functions are wide and varied and can range from weddings to funerals to Meal Ministry to Elder Away Days. Moreover, the group has been successful in the past year in recruiting catering volunteers and has implemented the new Environmental Health & Hygiene standards in a practical manner which included the training of at least 2 volunteers from within all our groups & organisations to ensure safe food hygiene practice.

It is however a bitter sweet moment when we recently learnt of Linda's decision to step down from her role in June 2017 along with her colleague Joan D'Arcy. As many of you will already know, Linda has recently become engaged to Stephen Thompson and we of course are thrilled about this news and wish them God's richest blessing in their future marriage and life together.

What an outstanding contribution Linda has made over the last two decades in this fundamental area of witness and we would very much value your prayers as the team set about trying to find a suitable individual or individuals to help fill this huge void!

appy New Year to our dear friends at West Church, Bangor, from all in India!
As we enter this new year we are hopeful, excited and busy. Thank you for your financial support—we could not do this work without you.

Empowerment from the ground up

As you know, relationships are central to the work we do. We work hard to ensure we know the name and story of each person we meet, reminding ourselves that 'the poor' are humans too. It is our friendships here that mean we get to build the trust necessary to speak into people's lives.

Our efforts have been rewarded recently with the privilege of seeing community here really growing. One of our favourite moments happened a few weeks ago. We asked one of the women we met at our Bhiwandi centre in the Mumbai slums if she would host one of our community support meetings in her home. Over 10 people came and were cared for excellently by their host. The lady was overwhelmed—she felt she was

not worthy to host such things and did not think anybody would attend. Seeing her empowered enough to care for her neighbours so compassionately was beautiful. It was a very emotional evening for all who attended!

Our regular field visits have also seen a rise in the number of people coming to our community centre to meet with our staff. We are so overwhelmed with visitors that we are looking for a new, bigger building in Bhiwandi.

Milk Producers Group

Back in July we wrote about our Milk Producers Group (MPG). Since they were established they have gone from strength to strength. We recently managed to organise and facilitate a meeting between the MPG and Dairy Officials for the district to discuss po-

tential partnership options. On the back of this, the Dairy Office has agreed to provide loans for the MPG which allows them to expand even further. The partnership also gives more scope for increasing sales with the Dairy Office having lots of connections. As the MPG expands it means more people are able to bring in

more income for their family, helping alleviate some of the suffering in our villages.

What else have we been up to?

As we said earlier, we have been busy! We ran Hindi lessons, writing classes and drawing sessions for local children which were very busy. We also ran pizza making sessions, weekly youth clubs and hand washing workshops to teach young people about good hygiene practices. We are also carrying on with beautician and tailoring courses and have supported some women to start making bags to sell in the local market. We also helped another woman who was great at making snacks for her neighbours to get a job in a local restaurant!

Just after Christmas we had another Hepatitis B awareness session with 42 women coming to learn and get their first dose of the vaccination. Another 43 women got their second and third doses too.

In both Turbhe and Bhiwandi we are carrying on with our community building activities at our centres: paper flower making with 71 women and decorative butterfly making with another 27. In total, 131 women attended community support groups in December!

We also ran an anti-trafficking prevention workshop for 30 couples in local churches. We taught them about the dangers of trafficking and how to care for their children so that they were protected. This went really well and we are looking to arrange a follow up session in the coming months.

One of the young girls who we work with recently turned 16 and was being pushed into an arranged marriage with a much older man. With our support she is still attending school and hopes to attend college after passing her exams.

Finally, goats are having a big impact on our communities as of late! Members of one self help group have started raising goats together to use for milk and then sell at market, and we recently supplied a family we assessed as being in the category of greatest need

with 5 goats for them to do the same. It's a joy to be able to empower people to be the answer to their own problems using their own resources and also meet the direct needs of people on the edge of survival.

Thriving in the slums of Mumbai


At Sahaara, we know that children are the future and so believe providing them with a good education, giving them the best start to life, is the key to a better world.

Iqbal (his name has been changed to protect his identity) is 11 and lives with his parents and two year old sister in the Mumbai slums. His father, Mohan (again, his name has been changed to protect his identity), is a security guard earning below the minimum wage, and his mother is a sex worker trying to make ends meet in any way possible.

We met Iqbal and his family during one of our visits to the slum a couple of years ago. Whilst talking to his parents, they told us he struggles in school. His chaotic home-life meant he struggled to complete homework

and his parents rarely had time to help him. Combined with lack of food leading to low energy levels, this intelligent child was struggling.

One of the things we do is run classes in the slum to coach children through school. Igbal was invited along and was assigned a personal tutor. As is often the case with the children that come to our classes, Igbal was clearly intelligent but just lacked confidence. Over the next few classes we worked on improving his self-belief and began to see him thrive! He is now also a regular attendee at our weekly youth club, and with his new confidence has made lots of new friends.

Late last year we enrolled lqbal into English classes at a local academy which is a very big opportunity for him. We know he has a very bright future ahead of him-he currently wants to be a community police officer. Igbal is one of the many children we work with on a daily ba-

COMPASSION INTERNATIONAL



ompassion is a charity that invests itself in the practical transformation of the lives of children in the developing world. The inspiration for their work is the Great Commission that Jesus gave to his followers. Compassion exists as an advocate for children, to release them from their spiritual, economic, social and physical poverty and enable them to become responsible and fulfilled Christian adults. This is primarily achieved through a creative and practical program of child and community sponsorship.

This winter, my son Elliot, was invited to take part in a promotional video being produced by UCB media promoting the work of Compassion, who they are partnering with over the next two years. This has involved filming what his life here in Ireland looks like in contrast to the lives of children in a new project being launched in Tanzania.



At the start of February the film crew arrived, they spent Saturday recording family life. The dog and I



attempted to be on our best behaviour, meanwhile granny and other 'wanna be' film stars tried to gatecrash the movie making! By 5pm it was a 'wrap' until the next morning when they followed us to West Church for Sunday worship, filming in the service and at P7 J Club. They returned to our home the next morning at 7am to capture the chaos of breakfast and the exit for school before videoing a typical day in Elliot's class at Strandtown Primary.

Elliot and I are currently spending a lot of quality time being labbed with needles at the vaccination clinic in preparation for the second part of the video production. At the start of April we are being flown out to

Arusha in Tanzania where Elliot will be filmed visiting a project and experiencing the realities of what life looks like

for kids of his age in a poor rural community in Africa.

The hope of the video is that it

will clearly show the impact that sponsoring a child through Compassion can make to a young person as they grow up. The transformation that can be brought for individuals, families and communities when the body of Christ here practically cares for and invests in the body of Christ in other parts of the world.



The finished video will be launched on the UCB media and Compassion websites in May, followed by the Oscars in February 2018! (it's a long -shot I know- but we are people of faith!!)

ACCOMMODATION ISSUES IN WEST

s you will be well aware, we are blessed to be members of a thriving and growing congregation.

This has many benefits to the members, but one of the issues it brings is the constant requirement for more and more space. This can be for many different activities, our ever expanding youth activities and organisations, the growth on Sunday mornings at our services and Sunday School or the growth in our midweek activities, such as courses and discipleship groups.

Kirk Session have been aware of these issues for some time and have been working to look for possible ways of dealing with the growth. A team has been assigned to look at the issues and have been prayerfully considering the different options. They have used the recent Jubilee Report as a source of information along with feedback from various members of the congregation and the staff team.

As a short term solution the Church purchased the bungalow and land at 93 Crawfordsburn Road. This has been invaluable as it has provided additional office space and a number of meeting rooms. However, even with this extra space we are unable to meet all requests for rooms.

We are now at the stage where we are proposing to pass some basic requirements to a number of architects to see how they could provide a solution which would deal with the current issues and allow for further expansion.

As this process progresses, regular updates will be provided to the congregation to get their opinions on any proposals.

Course in Prayer Ministry/ Divine Healing by Heather Thompson


his seminar will be held over two consecutive Saturdays, 13th and 20th May 2017, from 10.00 am until approximately 4.00 pm.

BOUNDARIES OF UNDERSTANDING

hris and I met as undergraduates in Law at Queen's. He noticed that I ate a solitary dinner before attending choir practice, so he offered to join me one evening after our circle of friends had gone home and we met on Tuesdays for the next two years to eat sausage, beans and chips and to talk.

Our discussions included our faith in God. Chris' mother had led him to Christ when he was little. His family moved from the Baptist Church to West when he was a young teenager; his parents later worked there as pastoral assistants. He had volunteered at Capernwray Bible College and spent a gap year in Israel with Operation Mobilisation; he was a member of the C.U. Wearing a beard and a Middle Eastern scarf he shocked me: only the essentials of faith seemed to matter to him and he said that if he parachuted into a strange city he would find the nearest church, disregarding denomination. He comprehensively knew his large leather bound bible and explained scripture engagingly. I was intrigued.

I had just finished fourteen years of Catholic education. I cannot remember not knowing God. My parents presented me for baptism. Daddy knelt with us at bedtime to pray; Mummy taught us harmonies to hymns. I recognised the importance of repentance early after reading a little book mummy used to prepare communicants. We never missed Mass even on holiday, Daddy asking

"iglesia?" until strangers showed him the way. At 7, I received my First Communion. I could hardly wait for Confirmation at 11. The story of Pentecost was attractive-how wonderful that I could receive the Holy Spirit by faith and the fruit would ripen in my life. I studied articles by theologians in the religious magazines at my grandmother's house. I was surrounded by people who had real faith in God.

However as Chris and I talked we were becoming defensive. Sacraments: two or seven? Communion: daily, weekly or quarterly? Infant or believer's baptism? Confession? Any real faith without evidence of Works? Liturgy: meaningful, empty?

At a concert where people seemed to be responding to an unseen cue, standing up and down and waving their hands, I tried to copy what I thought were just actions. I was used to reverential silence in church, wore ashes on my forehead at the start of Lent, took retreats, sometimes fasting and barefoot. He went on "weekends", sermons were remembered by alliteration; everyone had notebooks, pens, "quiet times".

After two years of cowboy suppers there was an unintended consequence - we discovered we were not just friends anymore! Theology, as it turned out, had not been the only attraction! We did not know how to proceed. But God always provides - we joined Christians Together at Queen's. It was nearly our first date. A very small group of students, Protestant and Catholic, praying together and singing the most beautiful songs in worship. It was appealing. Christians involved in reconciliation encouraged us to stand in the gap (Ezekiel 22) in the no man's land between the churches, and to learn the other church's language so that we could act as interpreters. May God bless those who invested in our little bunch.

We learned that some distinctions are matters of emphasis or even of style. Even serious doctrinal disagreements will not divide us in heav-

Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit – just as you were called to one hope when you were called – one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and father of all who is over all and through all and in all" (Ephesians 4).

The Creed, common to both the Protestant and Catholic churches, was the foundation. We caught the vision.

All of this seems a long time ago. Over the years, the distinctions have been absorbed into our one flesh relationship, a little picture of Ephesians 2:14: "for he himself is our peace, who has made us both one and has broken down in his flesh

the dividing wall of hostility...that he might create in himself one new man in place of the two, so making peace, and might reconcile us both to God in one body through the cross, thereby killing the hostility." How did this occur? And what contribution did unity make to our faith journey?

In Acts 18:24: Priscilla and Aquila took Apollos, who was already accurately teaching the things concerning Jesus, competent in the Scriptures, fervent in Spirit and instructed in the way of the Lord, and they "explained to him the way of God more accurately".

Therefore partly the differences receded as one of us explained more accurately to the other the way of God (although there was often dispute as to precisely who was Apollos in any given situation!).

However mostly the sense of difference has disappeared as quite unconsciously we each started to experience God as the other does. Scripture reading has become hugely important to me as a means of hearing God's voice: I am now the one with several translations and a concordance on my side of the bed. My sons tease me about my charismatic two step and I need plenty of room to wave my hands.

Meanwhile, Chris has found the Eucharist a very significant means of receiving grace. He listens to Sacred Space, an app prepared by the Jesuits to promote meditation and contemplation of Scripture accompanied by gentle music. He

finds the liturgy rich and appreciates the symbolism of the candles the incense, the beautiful interior, the silence and the peace. He has the Book of Common Prayer on his side of the bed.

The irony is not lost on us! It was not a

deliberate decision to take over the other person's habits. Simply we found God hiding in new places in times of need and distress. We wonder sometimes why He did it this way? Well, it stretched us. And it has made us laugh; we think He is laughing too.

Chris, having read the religion novels by Susan Howatch, started to attend Anglican services during the working week. Later, the Lord in His mercy made him desperate and those services together with Freedom in Christ were God's provision for him. Any time I was rocked by bad news, I desired to hear God speak in the midst of uncertain circumstances. His provision came through the gifts of the Holy Spirit and the Word.

God wants to speak to us and uses many and any people, places, methods. We are so thankful for everything we have received from Him. And for West Church, our home. A magnanimous place, varied and full of love.

The Lord has added to what Chris and I started with; we have been enriched, not diminished.

How good and pleasant it is when brothers live together in unity. For there the Lord bestows his blessing, even life for evermore (Psalm 133).

How good and pleasant it is when God's people live together in unity!

Together, we support 74 Home Mission Congregations, 21 in the North of Ireland and 53 in the South.

One project that is supported by the United Appeal for Mission is the International Café run by Adelaide Road Presbyterian in Dublin.


David Boyd is an Irish mission worker in Dublin—the only Irish mission worker in a city with a population that is greater that the whole of Northern Ireland. In Dublin there are many opportunities to reach out to people, however, it can be a challenge to overcome the secularisation that has settled in people's minds.

David has been working at Adelaide Road Presbyterian Church for 20 years and in that time he has seen the demographic of the city change dramatically, with an increasing cosmopolitan make-up that is reflected in his congregation.

Through an International Café, David and other members of the congregation have the opportunity to welcome and befriend those from other countries living in Dublin. David runs a Bible Study beforehand to allow an opportunity for discussion on spiritual issues. He shares, "I've had people coming who had never seen a Bible in their lives. Starting from scratch and explaining everything is not so easy at times, especially with people who don't have good English. It has been very rewarding though—it's great to see people grow from week to week as they get to grips with the claims of the gospel."

David's job as an Irish mission worker is only made possible through United Appeal. He says, "Here in the South many congregations are very small and it's only thanks to United Appeal that myself and other Irish mission workers can be funded."

Irish mission workers work as evangelists alongside ministers and congregations across Ireland. The work is fully supported by the United Appeal for Mission.


of Session and we then have a 'Get Involved' area as well. Clicking on any of these pictures will direct you to the groups and organisations that fall under these key categories.

We hope you enjoy the new website and would welcome your feedback —please don't be shy, let us know what you think.




ANY QUESTIONS

TRUSTING IN GOD FOR THE NEXT ROAD

ome time late in 2014 / early 2015, I went to the doctor several times over several months complaining that I couldn't raise my voice and that my throat was feeling narrower. Several rounds of medication later I was eventually sent to Bangor Hospital for an endoscopy test to see what my vocal chords were doing. As only one seemed to be working. it was decided that I should do speech therapy. Several months passed by and although, as a trained singer, I made good use of the speech therapy and understood how they were helping, this made the situation worse and I found myself back at the Ulster for more endoscopy tests.

So now into 2016 after more tests and waiting, in June I got an appointment at the Royal Victoria Hospital for a biopsy on my vocal chord cyst or whatever is holding my voice back. In September I got an appointment to see my Consultant for the results - I was ready to hear the words tumour, remove and hospital. I was preparing myself by being calm and spiritually dependant on God for what I may have to go through, supposedly ready for what my Consultant could say to me.

Well, I was ready for the tumour bit and got some good news that no cancer had been found at that stage. However, I was not in any way ready to hear that I would have to get my voice box out or that I would have a stoma in my neck which would become my only airway or have a vastly different voice. I had lovely support at the hospital by the Macmillan team after my news. However, as I do, I was praying on the drive home and the tears started (there's only so many tears allowed when driving which is a good thing!).

I told my brother and sisters and then Michael, Christopher and eventually Liam. As I spoke to Liam, being the clever boy he is, he realised that I wouldn't be able to make his



teddies speak in different voices. He was devastated, and that set me off again! (My fault for bringing his teddies to life.) As it was a week day, Liam was soon back at his mum's and I had time to myself. This tumour and the idea of losing my voice box was against absolutely everything I had become and ever believed in. At the time it felt against everything God made me to be too. There was nothing in this that was remotely God-driven. This tumour was out to destroy me. That night in bed I wanted to curl up into the smallest ball possible or run away from myself. I felt like I was just imploding-some kind of escape but I knew I had to find another way of coping with this. So, in the morning, now that my family knew, I started telling people, starting with my Home Group. That's when the prayers started and the peace came. It didn't take long for me to realise I had to do everything possible to fight this. And I did! I absolutely love the many friends I have, through West Church and beyond and indeed on Facebook. For the next 6 weeks or so I went many times to Healing on the Streets in Bangor and Coleraine for prayer. I went to other Services at West, CFC and basically got every


prayer I could from everywhere I could. My family came together so much too and I felt so strengthened with none of that fear from the first night near me. Along this journey I was taken to Eat Well in Belfast and heard some very interesting views I can't argue with on food as a healer—more about this again!

I got a date for my operation and on the Thursday the week before, something miraculous happened-I don't know if you know, but if you only have one vocal chord there's only so much range and strength and if you are trained in any way, you will know how to bring them together to work. At around 7.00 am, I woke myself up...humming as I breathed out but not a higher hum. A louder, low hum. Something only possible with 2 vocal chords! It took me a while to realise that the sound was me! Not wanting to wake Michael, I went out into the car, drove around and made as much noise as I could! I even phoned my sister Jayne and she thought it was my brother!

Over the next few days, the vocal chords varied from weak to strong but to this day, I have many witnesses that heard a louder voice and that I could really shout! (Ask the boys!!) This was a healing process -

a real miracle in progress! Into the next week I could feel it was now easier to breathe. But you know what? I could not see any doctor or get any quick test to see what was happening to my vocal chords. Even though when I phoned the Speech Therapist (mine had retired after seeing me for months-could you blame her!) she couldn't comment on why my vocal chords were working. However, a few days before my operation date, I had a new peace. I had done more than everything I could. If I was to wake up with a stoma that was God's will. There's nothing more I could do and it was now time to trust God for the next road.

As you now know, I did wake up with a stoma but I also woke up with minimal pain and no fear whatsoever. Just that peace I was now very familiar with. You can't beat that peace.



It's fair to say that I had incredible support from my family, Home Group, West Church, Silverstream, CFC, Shore Street, even churches in France and America all praying for me and with continuous love. kindness and friendship on Facebook, not to mention the many visits from my brother and 2 sisters and many friends, I was never alone. And that's just who I knew outside the hospital. The Doctors, Consultants and all the staff on Ward 29 at the Royal are just like a big family. I spent 5 weeks there and it really did start to feel like my second home.

Progress was quite slow at times

but I just did one day at a time. There was only one very, very bad experience when a blood vessel burst and I was bleeding dangerously from my stoma, Within 15 seconds, 10-15 nurses and staff were round my bed trying to stabilise me and help me to breathe. I just prayed for God to help them do their job, and He did. Very soon things had calmed down. Thankfully no more drama followed and after 5 weeks of being in hospital I was gradually allowed to come home to stay. As I write this, it's now February

and there is one thing about Christianity I truly love-love never gives up-or could that be translated in some case to what you love, you will never give up on? With the same kind, loving support, I am back to teaching several pupils at home, at Jenny Boggs and at Glastry College and Millisle Primary School. There isn't a full schedule yet but it's what I'm happy with as I build up my strength. I've also played at 3 weddings. At West, as you know, I'm doing what I can at J Club and help plan the programmes. I've even started Puppet Ministry and of course, back to doing what my gift clearly is-playing the piano. As for my social life, I've changed from coffee to tea but even with some challenging background noise at times, I still get out to chat with friends often. Financially and otherwise, I have been amazingly blessed and made some good decisions to try and stable things out. Thank you so much indeed-I can't put into words how grateful I am for every single act of kindness and what prayers have led to.

There is just one thing to add and that many people already know. I did have cancer. It was in my voice box and I only got this news at the start of the year. It's a journey I didn't really know I was having and I feel very blessed that I didn't have to go through what I know many

friends have gone through or are going through right now. I have huge respect for all those people, I really do.

All those prayers to save my voice box were answered indeed but not in the way I expected. It was really above saving me but I always sav. I trust God so much. I don't understand Him and I've no idea what He's doing, but I trust Him! And I love Him as my Father who loves me. I am grateful that I am still here and generally doing the things I did. He always knows what I need in the same way He knows what you need. Wouldn't life make more sense the other way round-start old and wise and make amazing decisions back to childhood? And how rich would we be in many ways, but no, life is a journey on a road to eternal life. Done right, it's narrow indeed or at least can be for what these days seem a lot of the time. 






















A TIME FOR EVERY PURPOSE UNDER HEAVEN

On approaching our apartment for the first time we noticed that our outdoor black bins all had holes in the lids. This mystery was soon solved when Mike opened the lid to discard some rubbish and a squirrel leaped out at him, in definite warrior mode! This creature was like a ninia, in battle mode and ready for action. These urban warriors kept us highly amused with their antics. So determined was one little guy that he lifted an entire wedge of pizza from the bin and climbed up the tree to devour it. He was in a fight for survival and was determined to guard his territory.




After fifteen months in the city. with lots of adventures and ministry opportunities which we have already told you about in previous articles, we felt a call back to the city of Stratford. In 2009 we had come for a year of training for Restoring The Foundations inner healing ministry. When we returned to live in Stratford we noticed something different about our little squirrel friends compared to those back in the big city. First of all they had a different look about them. They were smaller and extremely laid back. Not for them the fighting (and hissing!) of their city cousins... these squirrels were ready for fun, gentle, playful and would sit still, looking up at us and taking time to look around them and enjoy life.

We strongly believe that God can speak to us through any means He chooses, and He often speaks through nature. Our observations of those little squirrels whose behaviour was so much of a contrast. being both war-like and peaceful, reminded us of that well known passage in Ecclesiastes 3 verses 1 -11 and especially the last couple of verses:

"For everything there is a seaon, a time for every activity under heaven...a time for war and a me for peace... God has made verything beautiful for its own me... planting eternity in the uman heart, but even so, peole cannot see the whole scope f God's work from beginning to

When the writer talks about there being "a time for war and a time for peace" we know from our own lives that we face times of battle and times when we just need to rest. There are times when we need to press in with prayer, worship and

our spiritual weapons, and times when we need simply to rest in His presence, be like children and allow ourselves to play and look up into our Father's face.

- 1. Thank the Lord for the flow of those coming for ministry. Many nations have been represented from all over the world and some people are returning to their homelands with newly found freedom. Many of these people are in leadership positions in their churches.
- 2. We have had an enquiry from someone based in Thunder Bay (totally unconnected from our friend Carole) who works specifically with addictions in the Whitesand First Nations people in the very far north. She is hoping that she can arrange through her pastor for us to lead a conference in her area, so please pray for God to open doors as He
- 3. Our home continues to welcome

many who are hurt and broken by life and we try to maintain a haven of peace for those who visit. Pray for those who will come, especially missionaries, and those who are convalescing from illness in all its forms. 4. On a personal note we do miss our family and friends in the UK, and we ask the Lord to maintain those deep connections in all our relationships. God has blessed us with wonderful family, friends and neighbours here in Canada, and sometimes travel distances mean that we need to be really intentional about all our precious relationships. 5. Carole continues to update us with the Command Post. New members have come on the team. as four of the foundation team currently have health issues. Regular supplies of food and clothes continue to come from various groups and businesses in Thunder Bay, so we

A LEAP OF

Naomi Flood-Coleman shares her experiences of her first Mission trip

n July 2016 I went away with Kindfund for three weeks to Kenya as part of a team to work with children in 3 orphanages. This was a big leap of faith for me as I had many fears about going away from home without family to a totally different Country and Culture. which was totally out of my comfort zone. However I strongly felt God's call on my life for this mission trip and knew I was meant to go and that it would ultimately change my life for ever. As a result I did feel a lot of spiritual attack. Thankfully I had a lot of support and prayer and I chose to keep my eyes on God and put my faith in his promises.

God is so faithful and when it came to leaving for Kenva. I felt a strong presence of God's love and considering I was so afraid, I felt such peace like it was all under control and that I had nothing to fear. I truly experienced God's promise that "perfect love drives out all fear". (1 John, 4:18)





During the trip I really grew as a person I got really close to the children and the staff that worked for Kindfund. My eyes were opened to how little people have and how much I have. I became more thankful for all the blessings I had received from God and the home comforts I thought I would miss became insignificant. I felt so comfortable in Kenya that it was difficult for me to leave when the time came for coming home.

In Kenya, God taught me to trust and rely on him, particularly in the tough times. I was able to deal with it so well and all I can say is there is no way in my own strength I could have coped. God really did help me deal with my fears and anxieties. I know that God is with me always and trust he has a good plan and purpose for my life and that 'I can do all things through Christ who gives me strength'. (Phil 4:13) In April I will be going to India with Tearfund as part of a team with Connect Church and although I may have some fears, I am no longer controlled by fear and realise the freedom of faith, obedience and trusting in God's will.



For this week we rented a marquee and at night it had to be guarded so I spent two cold, windy January nights in a marquee on the coast of the North Sea! Probably not the best idea but it was a good laugh!

Since moving to University I have felt very compelled to consider how the way I'm living has an impact on the world and others around me. I feel God has been teaching me to live in a way that reflects His love for the world. As a historian, another thing that has made an impact for me is the verse in Acts 1 v 8 to go to the ends of the Earth proclaiming the word and that was in a Roman Empire context. In Britain, St Andrews is as roughly far north as the Romans ever got and so this wee town was the end of the earth as they knew it. For me it is so important to be proclaiming the Gospel here and beyond where we know people are now and that is something that really encourages me!

n the early 1990's, Rev. David Bailie, our Minister Emeritus, approached the late Walter McAllister about the possibility of starting a men's fellowship in the congregation. Walter stood down as Chairman in December 2010 and was re-

placed by Derick Riddell.

In the ensuing years, David's vision has borne much fruit. The Fellowship, which began on 21st January 1993, still has an average attendance of over 100 men from various denominations and backgrounds.



Back in 2009 our Committee agreed that we commence the recording of our weekly Friday meeting and it was left with me to pursue the idea. After consultation with Stephen Cully, our Church Co-ordinator and Bill Johnston, who heads up our AV Room, I was able to suggest three options and decide the best approach to start this recording





Friday morning in the Conference Room, just after coffee & scones—the men catching up ahead of their meeting beginning

ministry. We asked Ivan Seifert and Tom Davidson to record the meetings, both agreed and the rest is now history. Both Ivan and Tom took up the task and have done an excellent job. Both have to be commended for their personal commitment and faithfulness to the task entrusted to them.

- 4) Share them with Seamen's missions

We agreed at this stage to take the CD/DVD library forward and we now have an alphabetical listing available for our congregation. CD/DVD's are available to collect on a Friday morning between 10.00 am and 12 noon when Men's Fellowship meets. We also have a list of recordings available at the book library in the Welcome Area and you can contact the Church Office to request a copy and they can organise a copy for you.

CDs & DVDs can either be returned when you have finished listening or watching them so that another person can benefit of this ministry or they can be kept to share with others.

Take a few minutes and have a look at the recordings we have available and "Share the Good News" we have heard with others.
